Year 5 Camp

Our **Year 5** children has been organised for Week 6, on Monday 8th November and will be held at Kangaroobie, Princetown. Our school excursion program offers our children a great opportunity to experience settings and situations that they may not normally experience. Participating in camps allows the children to build on their self-esteem and interact with other children and adults in unfamiliar surrounds. Teachers gain great insights into their children is these situations. We thank Ms. Harty, Mr. Marshall and Mrs. Hayward for their capable organisation of this event and we thank in advance those additional staff members and parents who are attending!

Class Groupings 2022

Over the next few weeks our teachers are putting the final touches to class groupings for 2022. In doing this, academic, social and emotional considerations are taken into account to inform decisions.

We are fortunate at St. Francis Xavier to have our teachers plan learning activities that often allow our children to mix across the year group where they are working alongside all the children within their age and class grouping.

School is a place where children learn how to relate to other children. It is important that children learn to mix with lots of children rather than spending time with just a few favourite friends or children of like ability. They learn about themselves in relationships and identify qualities within others that they find positive and assuring for themselves. It is important at this young age that they experience many varied friendships and children of different learning abilities to their own.

We hope to inform you by the end of November of your child's class and teacher for 2022.

To assist with managing enrolments for 2022 I ask that any families who already know they will not be returning to St. Francis Xavier to please contact the school office. This allows us to contact families waiting for places as well as assisting with class lists and planning.

Foundation Transition Days

This Friday 22nd October we will hold our first Foundation Transition Day for our 2022 Foundation Children. All our children look forward to these days with great expectation. It is a sign of the life and movement that make schools reinvent themselves all the time. Many thanks to the Foundation Teachers for organising this wonderful experience for our 2022 Foundation children!



Orientation Day

On Tuesday 30th November we will hold Orientation Day when our new Foundation children come to our school and our Year 6's move on to their new school. We will also be promoting all the other children into their new classrooms with their new class teachers. This day provides a great opportunity for your child to familiarise themselves with their new classmates and class teacher.

School Procedures For The Bushfire Season

New fire danger ratings and warnings have been introduced in Victoria to provide clear direction on the safest options for preserving life.

Schools – and children's services – identified as being at highest bushfire risk will be closed on days declared by fire authorities to be Code Red. <u>Our school has been identified as a</u> <u>school at highest bushfire risk.</u>

Where possible, we will provide parents with up to three days' notice of a planned closure. We will contact you directly by letter, email or SMS with advice on planned closures and will confirm the decision to close by 12 noon the day before the planned closure.



Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child.

No staff will remain on site when the school is closed by the threat of fire.

We will also cancel any offsite activities and out-of-school care during the fire season if the activities are at risk. There may also be changes to school bus routes. Depending on routes, this may also occur on days when the school is not closed.

On high fire risk days families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan – on such days, children should never be left at home unattended or in the care of older children.

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the safest option when a Code Red day is declared is to leave the night before, or early in the morning of the Code Red day.

As part of preparing our school for the threat of fire, we have revisited the Catholic Education Commission of Victoria Ltd's self-assessment of our emergency preparedness. We have also updated our emergency management plan; reprioritised any maintenance works that may assist in preparing for the threat of fire and cleared our school grounds and gutters. I have also completed CFA training for school principals.

What can parents do?

Make sure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers. Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, by checking our website <u>http://www.sfxballarat.catholic.edu.au/</u>, and by talking to your child's teacher or any other member of the teaching staff.

If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan. St. Francis Xavier Primary School - Covid-19 Update

We continue to follow the advice of the Chief Health Officer and the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) regarding the spread and response to COVID-19. We are also monitoring the advice of the Victorian Government, Catholic Education Commission Victoria (CECV) and the Catholic Education Ballarat (CEB).

Masks for children in Year 3 to 6

The Chief Health Officer Brett Sutton and Paediatrician from the Royal Children's Hospital, Dr Jane Munro, have issued the new requirement for children in Years 3 - 6 to wear masks whilst at school, with a strong recommendation for children in Foundation to Year 2 to wear them as well. This new measure is a safe and appropriate way to get our students back to school and stay in school safely.

- 1. Students in Year 3 to Year 6 to wear face masks when indoors on school premises, unless an exception applies.
- 2. There are a number of lawful reasons for not wearing a face mask, including for staff and students who are unable to wear a face mask due to the nature of their disability, medical or a mental health condition.

We know that our children will adapt and are resilient. As this is an aerosol virus, the wearing of masks will help to reduce the spread and continue to keep children and families safe and healthy. Wearing a mask not only supports students to reduce the risk of catching the virus but spreading it as well. Staff will support children to ensure they know how to wear masks correctly.

We encourage families to purchase masks for their children. The school will have spare disposable masks available for those students who are unable to secure one prior to Monday.

Mandatory Vaccination Directions from Chief Health Officer

The Victorian Government has now formalised the COVID-19 Mandatory Vaccine Directions (No. 4). The Directions introduce mandatory vaccination for specific workplace industries to limit the spread of severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus (COVID-19) within the population in these settings. The Directions by the Chief Health Officer include "education facilities" and therefore mandates that people who work in these settings be fully vaccinated for COVID-19 by specified dates.

Who must be vaccinated under the Directions?

The mandate for vaccination includes:

- 1. any person who is employed by an education operator to work in an "education facility" or school (including teachers, early childhood educators and educational support staff);
- people contracted to work at an "education facility" and who will or may be in close proximity to children, students or staff, whether or not engaged by the education operator, including casual relief teachers, Breakfast Club suppliers, IT personnel, NDIS providers and auditors, but does not include delivery personnel or contractors;

- 3. staff of any other entity who attend an "education facility" eg. CEB staff, priests, School Board Directors;
- 4. <u>volunteers that attend an "education facility" and that work in close proximity to</u> <u>children, students or staff (including parent helpers); and</u>
- 5. students on placements at an "education facility".

What is the mandated deadline for vaccination?

The Directions mandate a first dose by 18th October 2021 and a second dose by 29th November 2021. All groups identified in the Directions in all Victorian education facilities, including Catholic schools, must comply with the COVID-19 Mandatory Vaccine Directions and be fully vaccinated for COVID-19 by the 29th November deadline unless a medical exemption applies. Individuals will be required to show evidence of their vaccination status or valid medical exemption. This will work similarly to the Working with Children Check/Police Check requirements – staff must be vaccinated to work in any Victorian educational facility, including St. Francis Xavier.

3. Staged Return for Children

As of Friday 22nd October, ALL children F - 6 will return to full-time onsite learning. **The week commencing Monday 18th October (Term 4 - Week 3)**

- <u>Children in Years 3 & 4</u> will attend classes onsite Tuesday and Wednesday and attend to remote learning each Monday, Thursday.
- <u>Children in Years 5 & 6</u> will attend classes onsite on Thursday and Friday with remote learning each Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

If your child is medically vulnerable and unable to attend school based on medical advice, please inform the school via email – <u>principal@sfxballarat.catholic.edu.au</u> as soon as possible.

4. Important Operations Update from DHHS

- Non-essential visitors should be excluded from school sites for this period.
- School tours should not be conducted on-site for prospective students and their families at this time.
- Incursions are not permitted at this time.
- Non-essential meetings, and all school events, gatherings and assemblies should be deferred or held remotely.
- Staggered start and finish times Schools should introduce staggered start and finish times to reduce congestion at the school gate during drop-off and pick-up times.

5. Face masks in schools for adults

- Teachers and education support staff are NOW required to wear face masks while teaching. It is recommended that face masks be worn while teaching.
- Face masks are mandatory for all school staff and school students aged 12 or older when travelling to and from school on public transport and when in taxis or ride share vehicles.
- All parents collecting children must wear a face mask unless an exemption applies.

6. Gatherings and Liturgies

- Large school gatherings (ceremonies, assemblies, school formals etc.) are not permitted at this time.
- Liturgies cannot be held at schools at this time, consistent with guidance on assemblies.

7. QR Codes and Signing-in at the School Office

• Please note it is mandatory for all visitors to the school to sign-in via the School Office or by using the State Government's QR code system.

- The use of Service Victoria QR codes for electronic record keeping is NOW mandatory for all schools to enable the effective contact tracing of any COVID-19 cases.
- The public health intent of including schools in the QR code check in system for workplaces is to capture those visitors accessing school buildings or indoor facilities, but not those entering the school grounds for reasons such as school pick up.
- QR code check ins will not be required for staff or students, or parents who come onto school grounds for drop off or pick up, but do not enter buildings.

8. COVID Safe Principles for Children and Parents:

- Any child who is unwell must not attend school
- Beginning of the Day Drop Off arrangements (see below)
- End of the Day Dismissal arrangements (see below)
- Entry and exit points to the school will be open, with additional staff allocated to ensure children are safely supervised
- Parents are not to enter classrooms at any stage and are to adhere to social distancing guidelines when waiting to collect their child at the classroom door
- Request that parents avoid or minimise time spent in or around the school grounds
- Regular School Cleaning
- Frequent announcements, messages, signage and red gaffer tape around school to remind staff, children and families of the need for changed behaviours

9. Beginning of the Day Drop Off:

Parents will be required to drop their children off in the undercover area and then exit the school in a prompt manner. Staff will be present in the undercover area from 8:30am to assist children with walking to their classrooms if required.

At no stage are parents able to enter any classroom. Red Tape and Distance markers will be outside each classroom door to remind all adults.

The parish will email those families who were enrolled for First Eucharist and attended the preparation program with the following information:

It brings the Parish great joy to be able to confirm with you that we will be able to host First Eucharist for all Children in Year 5 (and siblings) who have already prepared for this Sacrament.

As we progress to the completion of this sacrament we ask for your support to ensure that we can do this safely and effectively.

It is important to remember:

- 1. Bookings will be open on Tuesday 26th October at 10:00am and are to be made via <u>www.sapliturgy.net.au</u>
- 2. Numbers are strictly capped to ensure that we remain in line with Covid requirements. There will be a strict limit of 3 guests per Candidate.
- 3. (if 2 children are in the same family it remains at 3 guests for the family)
- 4. Masks will be mandatory indoors and outdoors
- 5. All people must log in via QR code prior to entering.
- 6. Proof of full vaccination will be needed to enter the church.

THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL - Sunday 24th October 2021

THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR B

Gospel

Mk 10:46-52

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Master, grant that I may see.



As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

The Gospel of the Lord

REFLECTION by Greg Sunter

This passage from the Gospel of Mark draws to a close a significant section of the gospel. It stretches from 8:22 to this passage, 10:52. Like other examples in the Gospel of Mark, the stories at the beginning and end of the section are related and shed light on what they surround. Like this passage, the event at the beginning of the section is an account of the healing of a blind man. Contained within the two healings of blindness, as we have seen over the last six weeks, is an extended lesson on discipleship. Within this section, Jesus speaks about his upcoming death on three occasions and each time the disciples display their own form of blindness when they fail to understand what Jesus is trying to tell them quite explicitly. In

this section, we have heard that discipleship involves suffering and hardship; it means placing one's own needs last and the needs of others first; and that discipleship is all about faith.

In this healing of blind Bartimaeus, we see all the hallmarks of what Jesus has been trying to teach the disciples in the preceding episodes. As a blind man, Bartimaeus would be regarded as 'imperfect' – incomplete – and consequently in a permanent state of uncleanliness. He would not be allowed to live within the bounds of normal society, nor have contact with people. So it is that Jesus encounters Bartimaeus on the side of the road, outside the city walls as he is leaving Jericho. Learning that it is Jesus passing by, Bartimaeus calls on Jesus to help him and the crowd tries to shut him up and remind him of his status. But Jesus calls Bartimaeus to him and, placing the needs of the other first, asks 'What do you want me to do for you?' When Bartimaeus makes his request, Jesus announces that it his faith that has saved him and his sight is restored. Bartimaeus, like a good disciple, then follows Jesus on the road.

Scriptural context – Blindness

Blindness is a powerful metaphor that is used repeatedly throughout scripture. It is almost always a metaphor for blindness of heart or blindness of mind rather than a purely physical affliction. There are multiple accounts of healing blindness in the gospel. Saul/Paul is blinded on the road to Damascus and only has his sight restored when he is baptised. The Pharisees are described as being 'blind fools' and there the prophets make numerous references to blind seeing as a sign of the Messiah's arrival. It is a very powerful image of being 'blind' to truth and 'blind' to the teaching of Jesus.

Have you thought? On the side of the road ...

When Jesus encounters Bartimaeus he is sitting by the side of the road – a reject of society sitting off to the side as the world passes him by. There are times in all of our lives when we feel like this: hurt; ashamed; unloved; rejected; cast aside. It is at these moments in our lives that Jesus really wants to 'break through' into our experience. If we allow ourselves to hear his voice calling us to him, then we too can 'throw off our cloak' – our old life – and join him on the road.

Living the Gospel – Bartimaeus, a model?

Bartimaeus is a man who has almost nothing in life. His blindness has made him outcast and he is reduced to begging on the side of the road. When he is called to Jesus he jumps up and casts off what may well be his only real possession – his cloak. Yet what he does have in abundance is faith and hope. When asked what he wants Jesus to do, his answer may seem obvious, but his desire to see goes beyond physical sight. He asks for the sight of one who truly believes and to whom the truth of Jesus is revealed. In this way, he is a model to all who would be disciples.

A beginning point for discussion of this week's Gospel with children:

- Q. Why do the crowd try to keep Bartimaeus quiet at first?
- Q. How does the attitude of the crowd change once Jesus calls for Bartimaeus?
- Q. In what way is physical blindness a symbol or metaphor?
- Q. When have you been 'blind' to a situation or truth?
- Q. How is this event a story about discipleship?
