Dear families,

Did you enjoy the long weekend? I know that I did! Sometimes it's important to stop and take a breath before we push on for the second half of term. This year we have had an extra-long, long weekend with the school closure day yesterday. Our staff spent time working on our literacy focus for this year; Structured Literacy. This called for new training as we move forward with this program.

Over recent years there has been much in the media around literacy standards across the Country. In my more cynical moments I often think that when there is no other news around, Education can always be brought to the fore! One thing that we know without any doubt is that in Australia, our students are fortunate to have access to excellent educators who have many skills at their disposal. In this instance, our school is no exception. Our staff are experts in education and our school has a history of leading the way in providing access to programs that are designed to improve learning outcomes for all students. Structured Literacy is a good example of this. We are focusing our teaching on strong core instruction which is evidence based and has evolved from the science of Reading and Learning.

We know that knowledge builds on itself. With the Structured Literacy approach we are using all the good elements of learning such as phonics, syllables, morphology, syntax and semantics to teach sound literacy skills every day. You can help us by ensuring that your children come to school each day ready to learn and rearing to go. Good fuel in the tank followed by a positive attitude to learning helps to build the conditions that allow our students to thrive. How exciting is that!

THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday March 12, 2023 Third Sunday of Lent (Year A)

Gospel: John 4:5-42 (Below is the shortened version)

A Samaritan woman came to draw some water, and Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink of water." (His disciples had gone into town to buy food.) The woman answered, "You are a Jew, and I am a Samaritan — so how can you ask me for a drink?" (Jews will not use the same cups and bowls that Samaritans use.)

Jesus answered, "If only you knew what God gives and who it is that is asking you for a drink, you would ask him, and he would give you life-giving water. All those who drink this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water that I will give him will never be thirsty again. The water that I will give him will become in him a spring which will provide him with life-giving water and give him eternal life."

"Sir," the woman said, "give me that water! Then I will never be thirsty again, nor will I have to come here to draw water."

Many more believed because of his message, and they said to the woman, "We believe now, not because of what you said, but because we ourselves have heard him, and we know that he really is the Saviour of the world."

(Gospel passage taken from Good News Translation® and used with permission, see details below*)

Gospel reflection:

Jesus is thirsty and so he asks a Samaritan woman for a drink from the well.

The woman is surprised because normally Jews and Samaritans did not get along. It was also unusual at the time for a man to talk to a woman he did not know- but even though it is unusual, Jesus talks to the woman anyway. Why do you think he does this?

Jesus is showing us that God loves everyone, no matter who they are, where they come from or the colour of their skin. Just like Jesus in this story we all need water to drink. We need food to eat. A safe place to live, somewhere to learn and someone to look after us when we are sick. Sometimes people forget that God loves us all and that we are part of one global family. They only see the differences between themselves and another group of people and this can lead to many problems.

So this week let's do what we can to help other people. Let's treat those who are different to us with kindness and respect. Let's share with others and try to live in peace.

'missing the mark'). Fr Jorge also hopes to visit the children this week at school.


Baptism Preparation – Ballarat Parishes

Curriculum News



Book Fair: We are very excited to announce that the Book Fair is taking place this year! Our Book Fair will begin on Monday 1st May and conclude on Friday 5th May 2023.

NAPLAN: This week students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 will take part in the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN). NAPLAN was first introduced in 2008 and has become a routine part of the school calendar in Australia. NAPLAN is how governments, education authorities and schools determine whether young Australians are reaching important educational goals.

From Wednesday 15th March through to Monday 20th March our Year 3 and 5 children will participate in these sessions.





Student - Led Conferences at SFX: Your child(ren) will be showcasing their schoolwork and discussing learning goals with you through Student-Led Conferences. During Student – Led Conferences, your children will lead the discussion with you about their school work, while teachers will help direct conversation and answer questions you may have.

These conferences are scheduled in week 10 of this term on the following dates: Tuesday 28th and Wednesday 29th March.

Bookings for these conferences will be open on PAM by Wednesday 15th March.

These meetings will last for 15 minutes, and we encourage all families to attend. Children must attend these meetings! We have several goals for holding conferences using this format:

- For parents/carers we hope that you will get to see rather than simply being told about your child's progress
- For students we hope students will take more responsibility for their learning
- For teachers we want teachers to have more meaningful and impactful conferences with you
- For all we want to maximize our time together, create ways to partner with one another to support student success.

Questions to ask your child at Student - Led Conferences.

Here are some questions for you to ask your child during their Student – Led Conference.

These are suggestions, so please look them over and pick a few that you would like to ask!

- 1. What are you most proud of?
- 2. It makes me proud to see that
- 3. Can you tell me more about ...?
- 4. I can tell that you improved in
- 5. What did you find challenging this term?
- 6. Did you reach your goals? Why/Why not?
- 7. What can we do together at home to support your learning?

We have deliberately formed them as Student – Led and not 3 – Way Conferences. Highly Effective Catholic Primary Schools promote Student Voice. Student – Led Conferences are identified as a significant way of developing Student Voice and all the latest research and evidence around Assessment as Learning supports this.

If a parent/carer needs to have a conversation with the teacher not in the presence of the child in regards to other matters, this needs to take place at another time. Contact can be made with the class teacher requesting further time if needed.

Little worriers look to parents and teachers for reassurance when they feel anxious. This can be evident in many ways, such as asking a million questions, wanting parents or teachers to make decisions for them or continually seeking praise. Some adult responses such as ignoring their worries or constantly reassuring them are unhelpful. As adults we don't have to fix our children's problems, but we do have to acknowledge when they are worried (even when it seems silly to us!) Similarly, allowing a child to avoid an activity that makes them anxious is counterproductive- avoidance may help kids feel safe in the short term, but it risks the establishment of a long-term pattern that can be impossible

Wellbeing News

A practical way to show that you are trying to understand them is to validate how they are feeling and help to normalise that feeling. It is positive to acknowledge their discomfort and help give them the language to express it, for example you could say, "It's normal to feel a little nervous and worried about swimming/ Naplan/ the party. When I feel worried I get a pain in the tummy/ sweaty hands/ wobbly legs too. I find it helps me to take some big breaths/ use my brave thinking/ tell myself I've coped with this feeling before. What might help you?"

This week we have Naplan testing in Years 3 and 5- attached is a great tip sheet for children and parents who may be feeling a little anxious or stressed about it.

Reflection on the Gospel

Third Sunday of Lent: John 4:5-42

Those privileged to act as catechists in the RCIA program over the Lenten period will be introducing candidates to some of our most treasured gospel stories. In 1963, Vatican II's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy called for the restoration of certain early Church practices. The two main features of Lent, baptism, and penance, were to be given greater emphasis in the liturgy and in liturgical catechesis. More use was to be made of the baptismal elements proper to the Lenten liturgy. Some features that were part of an earlier tradition were to be restored. In response to this call. John's stories of the Samaritan woman, the man born blind and the raising of Lazarus were moved from the weekday to the Sunday liturgy. Thus, three weeks into Lent, the liturgy invites us to take a faith journey in the company of a courageous outsider. an unnamed woman from a despised religious group.

A woman of Samaria comes to draw water from the well of Jacob, Israel's great ancestor in faith. She belongs in a long line of women whose lot as women is to undertake the burdensome, often dangerous, daily toil of carrying water so that their families might

simply survive. Jesus asks the woman for a drink and elicits a bewildered response. She responds, "How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?" This response provides the opportunity for Jesus to move into an extended and constantly deepening exchange in which the woman proves herself a knowledgeable and worthy dialogue partner. The pursuit of water, a key baptismal symbol in the gospel tradition, provides the catalyst for her journey to faith in Jesus as the Messiah/the Christos and her engagement in the mission of proclaiming the good news to her people.

The woman becomes both disciple and missionary prophet.

Commentators tend to focus on the woman's marital status, usually in negative terms. Because she is said to have had five husbands, many presume that she is a sinner: there is nothing in the text to support this position. Successive husbands may have died. Financial, religious or societal constraints may have functioned in her decision to remarry. The



"husbands" may refer to the strange gods that claimed the allegiance of the Samaritans. There is no consensus on this among scholars.

At the outset, the woman views Jesus simply as a Jew who breaks with established custom by asking her for water. She comes to accept him as the provider of living water. Jesus understands her life story and opens up the way for her to accept him as a prophet. She takes the risk of sharing her own convictions about the locus of worship and is gifted with new understanding and with Jesus' further self-disclosure. She leaves her water jar behind and brings others to faith in Jesus as Messiah and saviour of the world. She becomes both disciple and missionary prophet.

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Naplan week is almost here

NAPLAN week is almost here, and many parents (and kids... and even teachers) are feeling a little extra stress and anxiety. NAPLAN has a lot of critics, plenty of supporters, and a whole lot of parents and students who simply go along with it because 'it's just what we do'.

This article is designed to offer some general - and gentle - advice on what's coming.

What NAPLAN is

NAPLAN stands for the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy, a nationwide standardised test that almost every student in Grades 3, 5, 7, and 9 are about to sit. Its purpose is to provide information about how education programs are working, areas for improvement, and which schools need support in the teaching and learning of literacy and numeracy. Some critics argue that it doesn't do this particularly well... but that's beyond the scope of this discussion.

What NAPLAN does well

When it works well, NAPLAN does three things:

- NAPLAN results enable the identification of problems in the school system. And they point to places where education needs to improve.
 - For example, NAPLAN results have shown us education gaps for indigenous students, and for students in disadvantaged schools. We knew those gaps existed. But now we know the scope and range.
- 2 Literacy and numeracy results are made transparent at a national, state and territory, and school level. We now know that states and territories have different levels of achievement when they are compared on a like-for-like basis which NAPLAN allows.
- 3 NAPLAN shows us education trends over time.

What NAPLAN doesn't do well

NAPLAN doesn't give you a useful guide on how your child is doing academically. The test is done in March and we receive the results in the late part of the year. If you want to know how your child is doing, talk to their teacher. Great teachers can give you detailed information today about your child's progress.

NAPLAN doesn't give you any information about the quality of your child's character. It doesn't tell you anything about your child's ability to work in a team, to problem-solve, to show compassion, to be creative, engaged or resilient. It's not about your child's talents.

NAPLAN also gives us no information about the school your child attends in terms of approaches to discipline, school culture, school contribution to community, or the way it encourages students in areas not covered by NAPLAN: And in some cases it has been reported that NAPLAN, while providing data, doesn't ultimately lead to governments providing schools (or parents) with the resources needed when issues arise.

What you should do

Based on everything I've outlined above, you'll note that much of NAPLAN's focus is oriented towards education at a school, regional, state, and national level. While there is some individual focus, it's not really an individual assessment tool. It's more about how the school, the state, and the country are doing. Therefore, I suggest parents keep the following in mind:

- . Don't make NAPLAN a big deal. You barely even need to talk about it with your child
- Don't offer rewards to your child for doing well on NAPLAN. Research evidence shows this adds
 pressure, builds anxiety, and reduces children's creativity, motivation, and interest in real learning. (One
 mum I spoke to wondered if bribing her child with a puppy would be helpful. It's not.)
- Don't buy practice tests for NAPLAN. Your child doesn't need to rehearse for NAPLAN.
- · Don't worry about NAPLAN results. Leave that to the school

Instead, you might want to try the following:

- Do show an interest in your child's education, regardless of whether NAPLAN is on or not
- Do encourage your child to read every single day. Read to them. Read with them. Have them read alone. And do this regardless of whether NAPLAN is on or not
- Do have your child participate in sports, music, art, drama, and other enrichment activities to the degree that you have the time and money for them – regardless of whether NAPLAN is on or not
- Do give your child plenty of unstructured (screen-free) time to simply be kids especially when NAPLAN is on

What your child should do

More than anything, your child will benefit from not being particularly interested in or bothered by NAPLAN. Life should be as close to normal as possible for your child.

It's true that some schools want to see NAPLAN results before they'll consider enrolling your child. It's true that some elements of NAPLAN feel like they matter a lot to us as parents because we want to see our children succeed. But please – PLEASE – remember:

Your child's NAPLAN score is not an indicator of your child's value, your child's potential, or your child's worthiness. It's just a number. And it's more meaningful to the school system than it is to you or your child.

When NAPLAN rolls around, treat it like a small, gentle wave at the beach. It rolls up the sand. It leaves a small, temporary mark. And then it disappears back into the ocean.
