Religious Education News

THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday July 16, 2023 Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A)

Gospel: Matthew 13:1-9.

That same day Jesus left the house and went to the lakeside, where he sat down to teach. The crowd that gathered round him was so large that he got into a boat and sat in it, while the crowd stood on the shore. He used parables to tell them many things.

"Once there was a man who went out to sow corn. As he scattered the seed in the field, some of it fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. Some of it fell on rocky ground, where there was little soil. The seeds soon sprouted, because the soil wasn't deep. But when the sun came up, it burnt the young plants; and because the roots had not grown deep enough, the plants soon dried up. Some of the seed fell among thorn bushes, which grew up and choked the plants. But some seeds fell in good soil, and the plants produced corn; some produced 100 grains, others sixty, and others thirty."

And Jesus concluded, "Listen, then, if you have ears!"

(Gospel passage taken from Good News Translation)

Gospel reflection:

In today's gospel reading which is all about planting seeds, Jesus goes on to explain his parable and exactly what it means. The seed that falls on the path is like those people who hear what Jesus is saying but don't really understand it or listen to it properly.

The seed that falls on the rocks is like the person who hears what Jesus asks of us and starts off really excited about it, but who gives up following him as soon as it is difficult.

The seed that falls in the thorns is like someone who hears what Jesus says but concentrates too much on having the best things, the most money, rather than on being the person Jesus wants us to be. The seed that falls on the rich soil is like someone who hears what Jesus is asking, understands it, and lives their life as he asks them to.

Our Challenge: This week, see if you can be like the seed that falls on the rich soil – listen to what Jesus asks of you, try to understand it and live your life as God calls you to.

A special thank you to Fr Barry Ryan who celebrated our Beginning of Term Mass with us last Friday. The theme of our Mass was the importance of reconciliation in our lives, which fit beautifully with all the work the children had been doing for NAIDOC week. Fr Barry shared stories of when he was living in Papua New Guinea and the wisdom of the elders in caring for our environment. He encouraged us all to be "the body of Christ" and treat others and our world with kindness and respect. Many thanks to all the family members, friends and community members who joined us for our Eucharist- everyone is always welcome here at St Francis Xavier!

Wellbeing News

When he was smaller, my son always loved pretend play. When he turned 4 we purchased a dollhouse full of little people, furniture and even a toy pet. His face would light up when we would sit down to play together and we spent many hours telling each other stories and acting them out. One day a neighbour was over visiting and she laughed when she saw the dollhouse- she made a comment that I had a house full of boys, so why did we have a girls toy?

She didn't intend any harm by her comment, but this really got me considering how gender stereotypes can be harmful and there are a lot of them directed at our children.

Saying things like, "that's only for girls/boys," indicates to children that their choices should be predetermined according to their gender and there is shame in expressing themselves freely. Gender expectations limit choices and behaviour. It doesn't matter if the gender expectation is positive or negative, it serves to perpetuate stereotypes and inequality.

This term in our Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships program (as part of our Social and Emotional Learning and Personal Development) we will be exploring topics on stress management, help-seeking and gender and identity. You can support our learning at home, by your words and modelling of respectful relationships. The attached Parenting Ideas focuses on ways Dads (but I think parents of all genders) can communicate from their hearts as well as their heads, finding words to support, heal and advise when their children struggle.

WHAT IS NAIDOC Week?

National NAIDOC Week celebrations are held across Australia in the first week of July each year (Sunday to Sunday), to celebrate and recognise the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

NAIDOC Week is an opportunity for all Australians to learn about First Nations cultures and histories and participate in celebrations of the oldest, continuous living cultures on earth.

This year's NAIDOC Week theme, *For Our Elders'* gave us a great opportunity to discover, reflect upon and celebrate the First Nations Elders, who have played, and continue to play, an important role and hold a prominent place in our communities. They are cultural knowledge holders, trailblazers, nurturers, advocates, teachers, survivors, leaders, hard workers and loved ones.

This year's official 'For Our Elders' artwork was designed by Bobbi Lockyer, a proud Ngarluma, Kariyarra, Nyulnyul and Yawuru artist, born and based on Kariyarra Country in Port Hedland, who won the prestigious National NAIDOC Week Poster Competition for 2023 with her entry, For Our Elders.

"Where there is knowledge there are our Elders. Our Elders paved the pathways for us, taught us our knowledge, our history, they passed down their art, stories and wisdom. Our Elders are the foundation of our communities and role models for our children. With this poster I wanted to showcase how important our Elders are in passing down traditions and culture to our children and future." Bobbi Lockyer.

At our Term 3 Mass on Friday, some of our students carried our precious new Message Stick and clapping sticks during the Gospel Procession.

Traditionally, message sticks were passed between different peoples, language groups and even within clans to make alliances and to manage the movements of people and goods. They were often used to summon neighbouring groups to ceremonies, including mortuary or initiation ceremonies. Clapsticks, also spelt clap sticks and also known as bilma, bimli, clappers, musicstick or just stick, are a traditional Australian



Aboriginal instrument. They serve to maintain rhythm in voice chants, often as part of an Aboriginal ceremony. These beautiful cultural symbols were lovingly crafted and gifted to us by local Aboriginal artist, Robert Watts.



"I was born in Warrnambool and started drawing when I was very young. My art connects me to my culture and I especially enjoy drawing, painting and burning Australian animals onto my designs. I tried carving emu eggs a few years ago, and I now enjoy this medium as well. My art is relaxing for me, and I have successfully taught myself to paint, carve wood, carve eggs, burn onto skins and wood. I have recently started sculpting large tree logs into native animals and have many of my designs within the gardens around the Ballarat & District Aboriginal Cooperative." Robert Watts.

The Ballarat Courier featured Robert in an article in last Saturday's paper. It's a great read, definitely worth checking out. We welcome Robert into our St Francis Xavier School Community, and look forward to sharing more of his creations and culture in the future.



Reflection on the Gospel

Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Matthew 13:1-23

During the recent pandemic, we necessarily distanced ourselves from others. Some of us focussed on the natural world so that our sensitivities sharpened, and our planetary awareness heightened. We became more attuned to the complexity of nature and its rhythms. We observed the diverse feeding habits of the birds in the backyard, for instance, and their communication patterns. There was new and renewed interest in gardening, in the growing of vegetables and fruit in pots or in built-up garden beds. Such changes in lifestyle conditioned us to use our eyes to see and our ears to listen, as today's gospel invites us to do. Jesus' directive, "Let anyone with ears listen", is a reminder that we do have ears and that we do not always hear, that we do have eyes and do not always see. Ann Lewin's words come to mind:

"Seeing or not seeing cease to matter,

You have been prepared But when you've almost stopped Expecting it, a flash of brightness Gives encouragement."

(Watching for the Kingfisher, 2011).

To what sort of being, of looking and listening does today's gospel call us? The parable of the soil, of the seed, of the birds and the thorns, of the sun and the sower alerts us to Jesus' deep sense of connection with life in its multiple forms. It calls us to examine our connection with the natural world.

Let anyone with ears listen

For a long time, we have focussed on the human character in the parable, a character who evokes an agricultural world that is far removed from our post-industrial world, but not so far removed from the world of millions of people in our planetary home who live close to the soil and to earth's elements and who struggle to produce the food they need to stay alive. Is the Matthean Jesus presenting in the sower an image of an estate owner, or a tenant farmer or even a slave? Or is the reader being asked to imagine the sower, whether estate owner, tenant farmer or slave, as an image of an extraordinarily generous God whose life-sustaining gifts are there for all, no matter their readiness to



receive? It may not be one or the other but both.

What of the silty clay loam or red sandy soil, of the wheat or barley seed, of the birds and the thorns and the sun? We know that barley was domesticated some ten thousand years ago in what became bible lands and that these lands are also the original home of the finest bread-making wheat. The birds and the thorns and the sun are for another reflection. We bring our experience of looking and listening and being into dialogue with the parable and search out its meaning for us. We trust that God will ensure an abundant harvest if we but learn to look and to listen to the needs of a planet in peril.

Use your words Dad



Seven-year-old Thomas lay crying on his bed wrapped in the arms of his father. Thomas was upset and his dad was trying to find out what was bothering his son. His voice was quiet, and his words were soothing.

Gradually, Thomas opened up, sharing with his father how his best friend had embarrassed him in front of others at school. Unable to articulate his disappointment and anger, Thomas's father did so for him. "I guess you feel let down. I'd be really mad too if that happened to me."

Thomas let out a sigh, relaxing even more into his father's embrace knowing he understood how he felt. Empathy has a soothing effect on upset children.

Popular parenting author Steve Biddulph is correct when he wrote that activity is the main language of fathering. Dads use physical touch and play to build relationships and as a tool to develop self-control, teamwork, fairness, and other values.

However, if activity is the only way a man relates to his children, his impact will be limited. As Thomas's father discovered, physical touch may provide an entry point but it's through talking that we get to the heart of matters that bother children and young people.

Anecdotally, talking with kids about their worries and anxieties is still largely a mother's preserve. Sexuality educators report that mothers do most of the talking when it comes to sexuality, respectful relationships, and consent.

Talking through personal problems with a son or daughter is a new role for many men, especially for a generation whose fathers stoically advised them 'get on with it' when problems emerged. Many males feel more comfortable giving advice rather than solace to kids who are struggling.

The most effective parents are those who adapt to the times in which they live. The COVID-19 era requires parents to be even more patient, calm and focused on children's wellbeing. Parents of both genders need to communicate from their hearts as well as their heads, finding words to support and heal, as well as to advise when children and young people struggle.
