#### THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday November 19, 2023 Children's liturgy Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A)

#### Gospel: Matthew 25:14-30

The kingdom is also like what happened when a man went away and put his three servants in charge of all he owned. The man knew what each servant could do. So he handed 5,000 coins to the first servant, 2,000 to the second, and 1,000 to the third. Then he left the country. As soon as the man had gone, the servant with the 5,000 coins used them to earn 5,000 more. The servant who had 2,000 coins did the same with his money and earned 2,000 more. But the servant with 1,000 coins dug a hole and hid his master's money in the ground.

Some time later the master of those servants returned. He called them in and asked what they had done with his money. The servant who had been given 5,000 coins brought them in with the 5,000 that he had earned. He said, "Sir, you gave me 5,000 coins, and I have earned 5,000 more." "Wonderful!" his master replied. "You are a good and faithful servant. I left you in charge of only a little, but now I will put you in charge of much more. Come and share in my happiness!"

Next, the servant who had been given 2,000 coins came in and said, "Sir, you gave me 2,000 coins, and I have earned 2,000 more." "Wonderful!" his master replied. "You are a good and faithful servant. I left you in charge of only a little, but now I will put you in charge of much more. Come and share in my happiness!"

The servant who had been given 1,000 coins then came in and said, "Sir, I know that you are hard to work for. You harvest what you don't plant and gather crops where you haven't scattered seed. I was frightened and went out and hid your money in the ground. Here is every single coin!" The master of the servant told him, "You are lazy and good-for-nothing! You know I harvest what I don't plant and gather crops where I haven't scattered seed. You could have at least put my money in the bank, so I could have earned interest on it." Then the master said, "Now your money will be taken away and given to the servant with 10,000 coins! Everyone who has something will be given more, and they will have more than enough. But everything will be taken from those who don't have anything. You are a worthless servant, and you will be thrown out into the dark where people will cry and grit their teeth in pain."

#### **Gospel reflection:**

In some versions of the story instead of talking about gold coins, it uses the word "talents". A talent was a word for money in Jesus' time. This story is sometimes known as the "Parable of the talents". Jesus is telling us that it is important to use the gifts that God has given us. We are all good at different things. We all have different skills and talents. Some of us are good at singing, at sport, dancing, drawing, baking or building Lego. Some of us are good at speaking out when we see that something is wrong or unfair, some of us are good at helping others.

Whatever your talent is, Jesus is saying that it is important not to hide our talents from others – to just keep them to ourselves and never let them grow. Instead, it is by going out into the world, by sharing our talents and using our skills to help others that we serve God.

Our Challenge: How will you share the special gifts God has given you?

Last week, I was privileged to sit in on leadership speeches as many of the Year Five children outlined their hopes and dreams for our school in 2024. What impressed me most was their positive outlook and growth mindset. They frequently referred to "growing in confidence", "further developing their skills", "learning from their mistakes" and "persisting when things were difficult".

A child with a fixed mindset believes they are fundamentally limited- that who they are today is pretty much who'll they'll be in the future. They'll ask others for validation if they are musical, or how smart they are and school becomes one long test to discover the answers to these questions.

A child with a growth mindset understands they have the capacity to develop their abilities.

For them learning becomes a vehicle for creating and developing those abilities. You'll hear this child say things like "I want to become really good at maths, so I'm going to work hard to make that happen."

As parents we play an important role in creating the experiences that develop our child's mindset. What we repeatedly say, value and reward all shape our child's mindset.

In the attached article, James Anderson explores the idea of Growth Mindset and how we can empower our children to see life through this lens.

# **Contemplating the Eternal Verities**

33<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time: Matthew 25:14–30

In answer to my greeting, "G'day Muff, what are you up to?", my polymath brother-in-law, David (nicknamed Muff), would invariably reply, "Just contemplating the eternal verities!" The ensuing conversation would confirm the veracity of his response: contemplating the eternal verities was a way of life for my brother-in-law.

As the end of the church year approaches, the liturgy presents us with texts that invite us all to consider the big questions of life and death, including the day of reckoning that will inevitably confront each one of us.

Matthew's parable of the talents is part of a discourse about the final realities. It is sandwiched between the parable of the ten lamp-bearers, five of whom are unprepared for the bridegroom, and the end-time judgement of the nations.

The previous story concluded with the warning: "Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour." This is usually interpreted as a reference to the future coming of Christ.

Today's story continues this motif. It opens: "For it is as if a man going abroad summons his slaves and entrusts his property to them...."

Once more, we find slavery taken for granted. Once more, we might take this as a reminder to commit ourselves to the elimination of all power over others.

The slaves are entrusted with phenomenal wealth: ten talents, five talents, and one talent respectively. A talent was a measure of weight, one silver talent being the equivalent of 1000 days' wages for an ordinary labourer. The scenario is dramatically far-fetched, as is often the case with parables.

## Parables are open to multiple interpretations

The slaves are given amounts "according to their ability". They receive no instructions, but later events indicate that the master expects a good return on his money, despite the prohibition on usury in that society.

The first two slaves deliver and are invited into "the joy of the master", another possible reference to the end time when God will embrace those who are faithful to their mission.

The third slave does what was expected in that culture: he buries his talent. He also provides a reasonable rationale for his action: the master is a hard man who inspires a fear-ridden response. The master does not resile from this description and expels "into



outer darkness" the one who challenges his behaviour.

Is the master an image of God? Some elements in the story point in this direction. Other features, such as the concentration of wealth in one person and the treatment of the fearful slave, inhibit an unequivocally affirmative answer to this question.

In face of present inequities even within the most affluent countries, we may find ourselves in sympathy with the third slave insofar as he challenges the violent and exploitative actions of the master.

Parables are open to multiple interpretations and the eternal verities cannot be encapsulated in one story or one image. They bear ongoing reflection and call us to responsible action for the sake of the equilibrium or balance that Pope Francis advocates.

# Mind your language. How what you say creates your child's mindset.



One of the big ideas in education over the past 10 years has been Professor Carol Dweck's work on Growth Mindset. However, despite (or perhaps because of) the hype, much of Dweck's work has been misunderstood, or misapplied. Too often we've tried to teach about growth mindset, instead of teaching for a growth mindset. Importantly, the role parents play in helping develop a growth mindset in their child has been largely overlooked.

In this article I share a simple way you can help your child develop a more growth-oriented mindset.

#### About Mindsets

Your child's mindset is how they view their most basic abilities, like their talents and intelligence, and it has a profound impact on their learning.

A child with a fixed mindset believes they are fundamentally limited. Who they are today, is pretty much who'll they be in the future. For them, school and learning is a way to discover those abilities. They'll ask if they are musical, or how smart they are. For these children, school becomes one long test to discover the answers to these questions.

A child with a growth mindset understands they have the capacity to develop their abilities. For them learning becomes a vehicle for creating and developing those abilities. You'll hear this child say things like "I want to become really good at maths, so I'm going to work hard to make that happen."

#### Why parents matter

Contrary to what social media might say, you can't just tell your child to have a growth mindset. Their mindset is rooted in a lifetime of experiences.

As parents we play an important role in creating the experiences that develop our child's mindset. What we repeatedly say, value, and reward all shape our child's mindset. And I should know because I got it wrong.

#### What I did wrong

When my daughter was young, I encouraged her to try lots of different activities. She tried music, art, gymnastics, singing, the Maths Olympics. You name it, we tried it. And that's fundamentally a good thing.

The problem wasn't what I was doing. It was the messages I attached to it. So metimes when she wasn't keen to try a new activity, I'd say something like "Come on sweetheart, give it a go. You never know, you might be good at it!"

Can you hear the fixed message in there? "You might (already) be good at it."

I turned trying something new into a test to find out if she was good at it. I promised her the possibility of instant success. To make things worse, if she didn't have instant success, I'd often console her with something like "Well, don't wory. You can't be good at everything."

In other words, she'd failed that test. Now it was on to the next test to see if she was good at that instead. The unintended lesson: If you're not immediately good, give up.

#### Why did I do that?

If you just had an "ouch" moment, you're not alone. Parents say these types of things all the time. We say them out of love, and with the best of intentions.

When we see our child upset or struggling, our natural reaction is to want to protect them from that discomfort. But what I did was to provide my daughter with an excuse for struggle by saying "you're not that type of person."

Perhaps you've provided your child with a similar excuse by saying something similar like "I was never good at that either." The underlying message being "we aren't the right type of person to be good at that—we don't have those abilities."

#### A nudge in the right direction

To help us be better parents and nurture a more growth-oriented mindset in our children, we need a little nudge. A reminder that helps us counter any unconscious bias and ensure we create more growth-oriented messages for our children.

I've created lots of these nudges, for all types of situations. The one relevant to this situation is to remember that "Learning is about creating, not discovering."

#### Learning is about creating, not discovering.

In the context of trying new things, this nudge reminds us that we're not trying to find out if my daughter has those abilities. We're trying to decide if she wants to develop those abilities. So, now I might say:

"Darling, getting good at something takes time and the right type of effort. You need to decide if this is something you're prepared to invest the time and effort into getting good at."

The nudge helps us repeat this message over and over, slowly creating a more growth-oriented mindset. They become more empowered and see life as being in their control. They recognise they can become whoever they want, or need, to become.

It's like George Bemard Shaw said, "Life is not about finding yourself. Life is about creating yourself."
