Dear families,

#### Feast Day of St. Francis Xavier (Saturday 3rd December)

Our school will recognise the Feast Day of our Patron Saint, St. Francis Xavier, and celebrate the day on Friday 1st December. This remarkable man, who was born in Spain in 1506 and died before Elizabeth I ascended the throne of England, was the first Christian and the first Jesuit missionary to visit Japan, which in the sixteenth century was a closed country about which almost nothing was known. Although Japan was where he would ultimately devote several years of his life, St Francis



Xavier was determined to spread God's word throughout Asia to the people of what was then known as the Portuguese Empire. Revealing great courage in the days when many still believed the earth was flat, and two centuries before Cook's voyage to Botany Bay and Australia, St Francis Xavier not only travelled as far as Japan but also journeyed to Borneo, India, the Moluccas, Ceylon (now Sri Lanka), Mozambique and other areas that had not yet been visited by Christian missionaries, as well as visiting and working in China with a small pioneering band of Jesuit missionaries.

#### THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday November 26, 2023

#### Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

#### Gospel: Matthew 25:31-40

When the Son of Man comes in his glory with all his angels, he will sit on his royal throne. The people of all nations will be brought before him, and he will separate them, as shepherds separate their sheep from their goats. He will place the sheep on his right and the goats on his left. Then the king will say to those on his right, "My father has blessed you! Come and receive the kingdom that was prepared for you before the world was created. When I was hungry, you gave me something to eat, and when I was thirsty, you gave me something to drink. When I was a stranger, you welcomed me, and when I was naked, you gave me clothes to wear. When I was sick, you took care of me, and when I was in jail, you visited me."

Then the ones who pleased the Lord will ask, "When did we give you something to eat or drink? When did we welcome you as a stranger or give you clothes to wear or visit you while you were sick or in jail?"

The king will answer, "Whenever you did it for any of my people, no matter how unimportant they seemed, you did it for me." (Gospel passage taken from Contemporary English Version)

#### **Gospel reflection:**

Jesus tells us about the kind of person who will be welcome in his kin(g)dom.

This group of people fed Jesus when he was hungry, gave him a drink when he was thirsty. They welcomed him when he was a stranger and lonely, they gave him clothes when he didn't have any. They visited him when he was sick and in prison.

The people were very surprised and they asked Jesus when it was that they did all these things. He says, "when you did this to the least of my brothers or sisters, you did it to me." What do you think this means?

We are all God's children. We are all brothers and sisters – members of one big global family. Jesus is saying that he is in each one of us and every time we help someone else, every time we treat someone kindly, welcome them or share with them, then we are doing this to Jesus.

**Our Challenge:** How can we serve Jesus in others? Maybe our Reverse Advent Calendar can prompt us to share with those less fortunate than ourselves?



#### **St Francis Xavier Feast Day**

On Friday we celebrate the feast day of St Francis Xavier. St Francis Xavier was born in Spain in 1506. With St Ignatius Loyola, he became one of the seven who founded the Society of Jesuits. He was a traveller and adventurer. He preached for six months in Africa on his way to Asia, where he spent the remainder of his life spreading the word of God in India, Japan and the Philippines. He is the patron saint of missionaries.



#### "Love and hope do much for the giver as the receiver"

This year we will again be participating in the Reverse Advent Calendar initiative- a wonderful opportunity for our children to feel they are contributing and helping others in our community.

Many local families are food insecure and struggle to provide the basic necessities for their children.

The concept of a reverse advent calendar is that we all contribute an item from the suggested list and then these hampers are given to local charity groups for distribution.



#### Curriculum News



The St Francis Xavier partnership with the SunLit Project in 2024

In a commitment to maintain high levels of student achievement in Reading, Writing, and Speaking & Listening from Foundation through to Year Six at St Francis Xavier Primary School, we will commence involvement in the SunLit Project next year as a Level One school. In doing so, our community will become an integral part of an action-research partnership with LaTrobe University's SOLAR Lab. Teachers will align their classroom instruction to the SunLit methodology which was established and refined by St Paul's Mildura and St Joseph's Red Cliffs to closely align to the latest in educational research.

The SunLit Pedagogical Framework details the commitments and descriptors that you, as parents, will observe teachers and students working towards in 2024 and beyond. It is through deep professional growth and reflection that we set the intention as a staff team that we will live out the vision of the SunLit Project that, *"all graduates of SunLit schools are confidently literate"*.

The SunLit Pedagogical Framework is comprised of the following six commitments:

- 1. Evidence-informed Practices
- 2. Effective & Efficient Pedagogies
- 3. Structured Literacy Methodology
- 4. Knowledge Rick Content
- 5. Low-Variance Principals
- 6. Strategic Leadership


As a Level One SunLit school, these commitments will be used as a reference point by leaders and teachers to make consistent decisions that support high-quality structured literacy instruction.

One of the key principles of good implementation is to 'do fewer things, better'. As such, it is necessary to regularly evaluate, and to de-implement approaches that are not having the intended impact. Freeing up resources can enable schools to focus on more impactful approaches which may lead to improved student outcomes. As we begin the significant task of de-implementation, we do so in hope to streamline the teaching and learning experience in acknowledgement that our curriculum is already overcrowded. The key challenge of de-implementation is that we're not de-implementing things that DON'T WORK. We're de-implementing things that DO WORK in favour of things that WORK BETTER.

Hamilton, Hattie and William say "With teacher and leader workloads and burnout at an all-time high, it's time for deimplementation: de-prioritizing and deleting the less effective, higher-cost initiatives we implement in schools. Deimplementation allows us to focus on practices that have more supporting evidence and a higher probability of positive impact on students, and at the same time gain much-needed work-life balance."

When things feel hard, the temptation to quit can be very high.

Olympic gold medalist Nastia Liukin recounts wanting to quit after a hard practice, and her parents would always say: "You can quit. But not today."

Then they would explain: "We all have bad days when we want to quit. But if you do that, you won't achieve great results and you might regret this later. So you can quit on a good day. When you have a good day and still want to quit, let's talk."

So when your child comes home after a hard day at practice, a bad game, or a big loss, remind them: It's ok to quit. Quitting will always be an option, but not on a bad day.

In my family we have a rule that once you commit to a team, club or a season, you need to uphold your end of the bargain and complete what you started.

#### CHANGES TO POWERPOINT

# Inheriting the Kin-dom of Justice

#### Gospel reflection by Veronica Lawson RSM

Solemnity of Christ the King: Matthew 25:31-46

"It has long been a common custom to give to Christ the metaphorical title of King."

These are the words of Pope Pius XI who established this feast between two world wars in the hope of counteracting the growing secularism "in public affairs and politics" and of finding a way towards global peace. Peace would never be achieved, wrote Pope Pius XI, until and unless individuals and nations accept the "rule of our Saviour".

In many ways, hope for the global reign of the Prince of Peace seems more remote than ever. The challenge of war and the plight of those denied humanitarian assistance have marked new low points in more than a century of violent and ongoing conflict which is claiming lives in ever-increasing numbers.

The three-year pandemic underscored the vulnerability to violence of those rendered poor by the prevailing inequitable global economic system.

The world needs the sort of leadership that Jesus of Nazareth advocated in first-century Palestine, the kind of leadership that Pope Francis offers to our world.

The gospel for today provides a blueprint for Christian living in general and for leadership in particular. Matthew presents Jesus as both shepherd and sheep: as judge and king on the one hand and as a suffering human ("the least") on the other.

Works of mercy are the measure of justice or righteousness. Those who feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, and set the prisoners free are "the righteous/the sheep" who will inherit God's empire and have life.

#### Matthew presents Jesus as both shepherd and sheep

Those who fail in these respects are the unrighteous/the goats who fail to recognise the presence of the shepherd/king in the suffering of "the least".

Why sheep and goats? "Sheep" is a frequent biblical designation for the people of God's fold. While goats grazed with the sheep, they were never imaged as God's people, somewhat unfairly, I suggest.

This gospel story is replete with mixed metaphors. It is the gospel source of the spiritual and corporal works of mercy that have informed the Christian way of life for centuries. It focuses on suffering humanity.



In proclaiming an eighth work of mercy, care for our common home, Pope Francis has asked us to expand our horizons and to extend our concern to the suffering of the whole Earth community, human and otherthan-human.

The Feast of Christ the King brings the church year to a close. It invites us to consider ways to achieve the things that make for peace.

If we wish God's reign of peace to be realised on planet Earth, then we might heed the invitation of Pope Francis (in both Laudato Si' and more recently in Laudate Deum) to engage in "grateful contemplation of God's world" and in daily gestures that "break with the logic of violence, exploitation and selfishness."

We might also take seriously his urgent plea to become a synodal church, listening to one another and walking together in faith and hope.


