Dear families,

Lent seems to have taken on an extra meaning this year. Our time for fasting, prayer and almsgiving have also been impacted by events in our community which seem to cause us all to wonder what is going on. I know that I have had moments over recent weeks when I have wondered what is happening in our local Ballarat community.

If Lent is the time of preparation, Holy Week is our time of reflection. Yesterday we celebrated Palm Sunday when Jesus entered the walled city of Jerusalem. At this time, word had spread and Jesus was acclaimed as a Holy man, a Healer and the Son of the Creator. Just a few days later Jesus was mocked and punished. He was tried and treated as a criminal. Ultimately he would suffer the death of humiliation on the cross. In the darkest of hours Jesus would wonder what was happening to his world and why he had been abandoned.

The story doesn't end there. The gospel writers tell us that after three days Jesus would rise again. His message would spread far and wide. This new faith with its message of love and forgiveness would grow to the point where more than 2000 years later we still carry the story and the message. We are called to be the Easter people, the ones who live a life based on the message of the risen Christ. Let's look forward to Easter with its promise of new beginnings.



THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday March 24, 2024 Palm Sunday (Year B)

Gospel: Mark 11:1-10

As they approached Jerusalem, near the towns of Bethphage and Bethany, they came to the Mount of Olives. Jesus sent two of his disciples ahead with these instructions: "Go to the village there ahead of you. As soon as you get there, you will find a colt tied up that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. And if someone asks you why you are doing that, say that the Master needs it and will send it back at once."

So they went and found a colt out in the street, tied to the door of a house. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders asked them, "What are you doing, untying that colt?"

They answered just as Jesus had told them, and the crowd let them go. They brought the colt to Jesus, threw their cloaks over the animal, and Jesus got on. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches in the field and spread them on the road. The people who were in front and those who followed behind began to shout, "Praise God! God bless him who comes in the name of the Lord! God bless the coming kingdom of King David, our father! Praise be to God!" (Gospel passage taken from Good News Translation)

Gospel reflection:

Jesus was welcomed into Jerusalem by crowds of people. They waved palm branches and shouted "hosanna". How would you welcome Jesus if he arrived here today?

Our Challenge: How can we welcome Jesus into our lives this Holy Week and Easter?

Here are some questions for you to ask your child during their Student – Led Conference. These are suggestions, so please look them over and pick a few that you may like to ask!

- 1. What are you most proud of?
- 2. It makes me proud to see that
- 3. Can you tell me more about ...
- 4. I can tell that you improved in
- 5. What did you find challenging this term?
- 6. Did you reach your goals? Why/Why not?
- 7. What can we do together at home to support your learning?

We have deliberately formed them as Student – Led and not 3 – Way Conferences. Highly Effective Catholic Primary Schools promote Student Voice. Student – Led Conferences are identified as a significant way of developing Student Voice. The latest research and evidence around Assessment as Learning supports this.

If a parent/carer needs to have a conversation with the teacher not in the presence of the child in regards to other matters, this needs to take place at another time. Contact can be made with the class teacher requesting further time if needed.



HOLY LAND COLLECTION

The annual collection for the support of the church in the Holy Land will take place on Good Friday, For 800 years. the Franciscan Friars have shared the difficult lives of Christians in the countries that make up the Franciscan Custody of the Holy Land: Israel and Palestine, Egypt, Syria, Jordan, Lebanon, Rhodes, and Cyprus. The people of these countries face many difficulties, particularly Christians due to their minority status. Among them, the friars have never ceased offering their pastoral care. Two years ago, the pandemic was causing havoc for the people in the Holy Land (as it was in the rest of the world), but now there is a new and more dangerous threat through the ongoing conflict which may last for quite some time. Just when pilgrims were starting to return, the Sacred Places of our Christian Faith are once again closed to pilgrims. Pilgrims are vital because they generate income that allows the friars and the local Church to fulfil their mission of caring for the Holy Places. which also giving work to local people, as well as running parishes, schools and caring for orphans, refugees, the homeless, and more.

She Has Done What She Could

Gospel reflection by Veronica Lawson RSM

Passion/Palm Sunday: Mark 11:1-10; 14:1-15:47

Mark 11:1-10

Mark's account of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem is more restrained and less victorious in tone than the other gospel accounts.

In keeping with Mark's gospel as a whole, it forms part of the relentless journey of Jesus the suffering Messiah towards Jerusalem, the place of his death.

The longed-for liberation will come about in Jerusalem, through powerlessness, suffering and death rather than through the exercise of might and power.

Mark 14:1-15:47

The gospel account of the suffering and death of Jesus opens with the story of an insightful but unnamed woman who pours out healing ointment on the head of Jesus.

We might reflect on the Eucharistic character of her actions of breaking and pouring and of Jesus' assurance that what she has done will be told in memory of her. She did "what she could".

The story of her support for Jesus is sandwiched between two stories of opposition: an assassination plot on the part of the religious authorities, and the foreshadowing of Jesus' betrayal at the hands of a close

follower. Status does not guarantee goodness or insight.

As the story unfolds, we hear that despite his earlier instruction to "stay awake", Jesus' closest followers fall asleep when he most needs them. Worse than that, they betray, deny, and abandon him.

Some Galilean women remain faithful

Some Galilean women remain faithful. They have followed him and looked after him on the long journey from Galilee to Jerusalem. They become witnesses to his death and burial.

These women will also discover the empty tomb and take the message of the resurrection to the male disciples.

A foreign passer-by, Simon, whose sons are known to Mark's community, shoulders part of the burden. An ordinary Roman soldier realises and proclaims that Jesus is of God.

The story has come full circle: the first verse of the gospel announced the beginning of the good news of Jesus, the Christ, and the Son of God. Now the reader understands what it means to make such a proclamation.



The final chapter is to be celebrated next weekend. The mystery is to be lived every day of every week.

As we enter into the holiest week of the liturgical year, we might consider our call to bring the power of Christ's redeeming love to those who suffer crucifixion in our own times: those enduring the ravages of war; the more-than-human Earth community affected by climate change; asylum seekers and refugees who look for justice.

It is all too easy to deny, betray, and abandon the suffering others. Like the woman who poured out the healing ointment on the head of Jesus, we also must do what we can.
