#### Safe Travel Around School

It is vitally important that all adults observe the safety rules when approaching our school at drop off and pick up times. Parents are reminded of the need to be patient and to move with the flow of the traffic along Fortune Street by proceeding up to and around the tree (marked with a white cross) which is on the left-hand side of the road at the Golf Course end of the school. Drivers cannot legally cross the



double lines which extend from the bus parking area at the front of the school to the end of the barrier fence that is located opposite the school. Doing so risks the safety of other children and drivers. At pick up and drop off times most traffic on Fortune Street is directly connected to our school community so it is very important that we look out for each other and model safe practices at all times.

#### **Religious Education News**

### THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday July 14, 2024 Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B)

**Gospel:** Mark 6:7-13 Jesus taught in all the neighboring villages. Then he called together his twelve apostles and sent them out two by two with power over evil spirits. He told them, "You may take along a walking stick. But don't carry food or a traveling bag or any money. It's all right to wear sandals, but don't take along a change of clothes. When you are welcomed into a home, stay there until you leave that town. If any place won't welcome you or listen to your message, leave and shake the dust from your feet as a warning to them." The apostles left and started telling everyone to turn to God. They forced out many demons and healed a lot of sick people by putting olive oil[d] on them. (Gospel passage taken from Contemporary English Version)

### **Gospel reflection:**

Jesus sent his disciples out to spread his word, but told them to take very little with them. The disciples had nothing – it must have been very difficult without food or money. They had to rely on the people they met along the way being kind and generous, inviting the disciples to stay with them and share their food.

In the world today some people have to leave their homes very quickly, because of fighting nearby, or because of floods or other natural disasters. They do not get to take very much with them – just what they can carry. Khodesa had to leave her home in Myanmar and travel to the neighbouring country of Bangladesh, because of violence. She waited until her baby was a week old before she set out. Before then they hid with her three older children outside their village for safety. Khodesa said, "We walked for days through the jungle before reaching the border with Bangladesh, then we had to wait to cross. We started with four bags but had to abandon them on the way. We survived by begging for food from other refugees"

How do you think Khodesa felt, having to flee her home with her family? And how do you think she felt when others shared their food with her?

## LAUDATO SI

In his encyclical Laudato Si', Pope Francis reminds us that everything is connected. Our relationship with nature is not separate from our relationship with God and others. This concept of integral ecology encourages us to care for the Earth and each other. It calls us to action. The Diocesan Social Justice Commission, in collaboration with Caritas (Diocese of Ballarat), Earthcare Ballarat and the Pastoral Ministry Office offer the following:

Save energy at home: Much of our electricity and heat are powered by coal, oil and gas. Use less energy by reducing your heating and cooling use, switching to LED light bulbs and energy-efficient electric appliances, washing your laundry with cold water or hanging things to dry instead of using a dryer. Improving your home's energy efficiency, through better insulation for instance, or replacing your oil or gas furnace with an electric heat pump, can reduce your carbon footprint by up to 900 kilograms of CO2e per year.

## Gospel reflection by Veronica Lawson RSM

Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time:

o be a disciple of Jesus is to experience a call. It is also to be sent on a mission in partnership with others, a mission invariably expressed in terms of preaching, teaching, healing, and/or driving out of demons or unclean spirits. In other words, it is to be authorised to do what Jesus did and to proclaim what he proclaimed. When we hear of Jesus casting out demons and telling his disciples to do likewise, we tend to think that whatever they did is something that belongs to another time and has little to do with our contemporary society. In the cosmology of the time, there was a realm between the divine and the human that was inhabited by good and evil spirits (angels and demons). The divide between these realms was conceptualised as porous so that humans could be protected by the angels or "possessed" by the demons. While the cosmology of the twenty-first century has no "place" for such beings, the contemporary imagination allows space for a metaphorical engagement with the angelic and demonic. When we speak of "demons" now, we are talking about something recognisable in human experience, even if somewhat removed from the "demons" that beset the poor in the Roman imperial provinces of the first century.

Today's parents spend much of their time metaphorically "casting out the demons" that beset their children, as do our friends when they sit and listen to the pain in our hearts and help us to let go of the "demons" that so often inhabit our psyches. Many health professionals are paid to heal the hurts as well as the cuts and burns. They drive out the demons of fear and hate and prejudice and of paralysing mental illness.

Educators also, aware that learning occurs only when students are relatively free from fear and anxiety, know what it means to drive out the demons. The recent experience of pandemic and of violence in its many forms has unleashed new "demons" of fear and distrust.



We are called to be attentive to the pain in the hearts of those affected in these ways.

It is significant that Jesus instructs the disciples to travel light. They need the basics to live and to do their job, but if their mission is to be effective, they must be free from the anxiety that comes from excess. Psychologist and social critic John F. Schumacher suggests that societies with the most material goods tend to be the most anxious. "Mutual respect, communitymindedness, an eagerness to share, reverence for nature, thankfulness and love of life", it seems, are the major ingredients for a stress- or "demon"-free personal and community life. There would be no need to shake the dust from our feet for want of hospitality if that were the way we all chose to live. What's more, if we travelled light there would be enough for all on our planet, the human and other-and-human, to live in dignity and peace.
