#### THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday August 11, 2024 Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B)

**Gospel: John 6:41-51** The people started grumbling because Jesus had said he was the bread that had come down from heaven. They were asking each other, "Isn't he Jesus, the son of Joseph? Don't we know his father and mother? How can he say that he has come down from heaven?"

Jesus told them: Stop grumbling! No one can come to me, unless the Father who sent me makes them want to come. But if they do come, I will raise them to life on the last day. One of the prophets wrote, "God will teach all of them." And so everyone who listens to the Father and learns from him will come to me. The only one who has seen the Father is the one who has come from him. No one else has ever seen the Father. I tell you for certain that everyone who has faith in me has eternal life.

I am the bread that gives life! Your ancestors ate manna in the desert, and later they died. But the bread from heaven has come down, so that no one who eats it will ever die. I am that bread from heaven! Everyone who eats it will live forever. My flesh is the life-giving bread I give to the people of this world. (*Gospel passage taken from CEV*) **Our Challenge:** How can we live by Jesus's example and his teaching?



#### **Arrival of the Message Stick**

To mark the 150th anniversary of the birth of the Ballarat Diocese, five Message Sticks were gifted to carry the message to:

Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer (Romans 12:12).

In Aboriginal culture, Message Sticks were passed between different clans and language groups to establish information and transmit messages. They were often used to invite neighbouring groups to corroborees, initiation ceremonies, right of entry to country and invitation to religious rituals.

At our assembly this morning, we celebrated the arrival of a Message Stick that is travelling across our Diocese in honour of 150 years. These Message Sticks are being carried from school to school to remind us of the interconnectedness of all our school communities - from the Murray to the Sea. We will display this Message Stick in our front office, together with an explanation of the symbols depicted in its art.

#### **Wellbeing News**

Standard 3: Children and young people are empowered about their rights, participate in decisions affecting them and are taken seriously.



This week at St Francis Xavier we are acknowledging 'Bullying No Way' week. This year's theme is 'Everyone Belongs'. Bullying No Way Week is an opportunity to promote the importance of peer, school, parent and community connections - where every child feels safe, supported and respected.

Positive school climates that value diversity and inclusion can foster a sense of belonging and provide a protective factor against negative peer relationships and reduce bullying.

Teachers play an important role in supporting students' sense of belonging. Prioritising high-quality and respectful teacher-student relationships leads to supportive and caring classrooms where everyone is respected and treated fairly. When teachers create a positive learning environment, it helps students feel like they belong and reduces the occurrence of negative behaviours such as bullying.

I have another podcast recommendation for you all - 'Bullying and Belonging' from the Department of Education and Associate Professor and Educational and Developmental Psychologist at Monash University Dr Kelly-Ann Allen. Dr Allen discusses the importance of belonging in schools and how it can help to prevent bullying. This podcast is produced on behalf of Bullying No Way: National week of action - an initiative of the Australian Schools Anti-Bullying Collective.

If you feel as though as a family you need to respond to bullying here are a few tips:

Schools can be much more effective when parents report bullying and support their efforts to deal with it.

If your child reports that bullying is occurring at school, or the bullying involves students from the school outside of school, you should let the school know the situation.

Working together with the school is the best way to help your child resolve bullying issues.

Schools will work with you to resolve the situation and will also work with the other student's parents. Due to privacy law, they will not be able to share information about any other students involved.

#### LEADERSHIP AND GOVERNANCE FOR A SYNODAL CHURCH

Leadership and Governance for a Synodal Church
Thank you to all who attended the formation gathering at
Buninyong in preparation for the Diocesan Assembly.
Members of our Parish Council, Finance Council and
Liturgy Team were joined by parishioners from Bungaree
and the Cathedral parishes, together with members of
Diocesan Commissions, Councils and Boards as well as
Sisters of Mercy. Thank you to the Buninyong community
for hosting this gathering for the Diocese.

In preparation for the Ballarat Diocesan Assembly (November 15th - 16th), these formation gatherings are being held to inform and explore the focus of the Diocesan Assembly. Each of the 29 parishes of the Diocese will be invited to nominate two delegates to attend the Assembly that will be held at Federation University, Mt Clear.

Pope Francis is providing leadership for a synodal Church and the Plenary Council of the Australian Church has recognised that the practice of synodality requires greater transparency in decision making, with the appropriate participation of all the baptised, giving witness to the equal dignity of women and men. The Plenary Council has affirmed a culture of synodality for parishes and dioceses, where healthy and fruitful relationships between clergy and laity "recognise different but complementary charisms and opportunities for co-responsibility", and desire "consultative and collaborative approaches to governance at all levels in the Church." The emphasis on listening and discernment for a synodal Church reveals how the People of God may be more centred on Christ, build healthy and respectful relationships amongst ourselves, and be effective missionary disciples in the Spirit. # Stop Grumbling and Listen

Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus was a Jew, as was John, the author of the gospel. It may seem strange, therefore, that John has the "Jews" complaining about Jesus. It is indeed strange and it has caused many a reader to wonder. John seems to use the designation "Jew" as a code word for the opponents of Jesus. These opponents are almost exclusively Jewish leaders rather than the ordinary people who followed Jesus. The designation does not include all the Jewish leaders of course: Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea stand out as leaders who came to believe in Jesus as the Christ or Messiah and to take risks on account of their faith. The complaint of the "Jews" relates to Jesus' claim, "I am the bread that came down from heaven". Jesus shares the world view or cosmology of his contemporaries: God is in the heavens above, so that anything or anyone coming from God in that world view comes down from heaven. The problem for his adversaries is that Jesus is one of them: they know his father Joseph and his forebears, so how can he be making such a claim? They make the mistake of thinking that this is all there is to know about his origins. "Stop grumbling" is Jesus' response to them. He proceeds to tell them that there are dimensions of his being of which they know nothing. And yet, they need to know, as do we. It is God who draws us to the teaching and to the way of Jesus. Like the opponents of Jesus, we need to listen and to learn, to be taught by God. We need bread in order to live and we also need the bread of God's teaching.



Jesus makes a future promise: the bread he offers is different from the bread the Israelites ate in the desert, in that those who eat of it will live forever. Furthermore, the bread that he will give for the life of the world is his flesh. This leads to further misunderstanding and the opportunity for Jesus to teach at another level. The eucharistic overtones in today's reading are subtle but nonetheless present, as they were in the feeding story.

John is writing some seventy years after the death of

Jesus for communities that gathered every week for the breaking of the bread-in remembrance of him and of all that he enacted. Like the early Christians, we reflect on the meaning of eucharist. We recognise and honour the materiality of the bread that Jesus shares with all living creatures. At the same time, we are invited to reflect on the symbolic or metaphorical resonances of both bread and flesh in the context of the claims of the Johannine Jesus. The question for us then becomes: "How do we live into this extraordinary mystery as we face the demands of our endangered planet and the challenge of dealing with the dislocating effects of war and global inequity?"

Chef Damien will also share how mentoring has impacted his career.



Big Brothers Big Sisters Australia (BBBS) is a nonprofit organization dedicated to offering extended mentorship to atrisk youth in need of assistance. By fostering one-on-one mentoring relationships, we aim to alleviate feelings of loneliness and isolation among young individuals.

Our mentoring program emphasizes long-term engagement. Both the volunteer and the young person agree to meet for an hour every week, for at least 12 months. Numerous matches extend well beyond this initial commitment, some lasting for years or even a lifetime.
