Summer School Uniform

With the warmer weather ahead (we can hope!), full summer uniform is required for Term Four. There will be a three week transition period at the beginning of the term to allow for Ballarat's fluctuating weather, with the expectation that the Summer uniform will be worn consistently from Week Four. Please be mindful that our uniform policy also asks that students observe safety regulations regarding jewellery at all times. As we are a Sunsmart school it is a requirement that we all wear hats when we are outside. Your help with our continued high standard of uniform requirements and expectations will be greatly appreciated.

Car Park – Traffic Movement

We wish to remind everyone at the start of this new term that the management of traffic flow at the beginning and end of the day is always a concern. We are fortunate that there is very little non-school traffic in the mix at these times. If the road signage and markings are adhered to with a good level of patience a safe environment can be maintained. We remind drivers to pull off to the left around the trees where the buses travel and U-turn to return down Fortune Street rather than cross directly across the traffic. (This is illegal!).

Our staff car park is not to be used as a pathway to either drop your children at school or pick them up. Car spaces are limited and the onsite car park is for staff cars only. Many thanks for your assistance with these matters.

Class Groupings 2025

Over the next few weeks teachers will be working on formulating class groupings for 2025. In doing this, academic, social and emotional considerations will be taken into account to inform decisions. We are fortunate at St. Francis Xavier to have our teachers plan learning activities that often allow our children to mix across the year group where they are working alongside.

Next year all our classes will be straight classes. Prior to teachers working on the construction of 2025 class groups, all children will be asked to nominate 4 children who they know they can work well with and would like to be considered to be in the same class in 2025.


THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday October 6th, 2024 Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B)

Gospel: Mark 10:2-16 Some people brought their children to Jesus so he could bless them by placing his hands on them. But his disciples told the people to stop bothering him. When Jesus saw this, he became angry and said, "Let the children come to me! Don't try to stop them. People who are like these little children belong to the kingdom of God. I promise you that you cannot get into God's kingdom, unless you accept it the way a child does." Then Jesus took the children in his arms and blessed them by placing his hands on them. (*Gospel passage taken from CEV*)

Gospel reflection: People were bringing their children to Jesus for his blessing, but the disciples tried to stop them. Perhaps they thought the children would bother Jesus, that he would find them too loud or lively: or maybe the disciples were worried that Jesus was tired or hungry and that it was time for him to rest.

Jesus is upset and tells the disciples to let the children come to him. He says that they have a special way of looking at the world and of understanding things, which adults can learn from. Jesus welcomed and blessed the children who came to see him. He loves us all. No matter where in the world we live. Whether we are old or young, big or small, rich or poor.

In today's gospel, Jesus welcomes the children and shows the disciples how important they are. How does it make you feel to know that Jesus thinks all children are important and that he wanted to listen to them?

"A Call for Inclusivity"

Twenty Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time



The Taliban's recent decision to enact draconian laws in relation to Afghani women's presence in the community, their attire and even their right to speak in public has foregrounded the global issue of gender inclusivity. Even in countries where the law permits equal voice and equal access to positions of leadership, there is no country or religion on earth that can claim gender equity in practice. Since the creation of patriarchy in the Bronze Age, some 3000 years ago, lack of gender inclusivity has posed a challenge, particularly for those who find themselves excluded.

The "test" question about divorce that the Pharisees put to Jesus is very strange in a first century Jewish context, as is the reference to women divorcing their husbands. While there is no evidence that anyone in Jewish circles questioned the legality of divorce, there is plenty of evidence for lively debate concerning the grounds on which a Jewish man could divorce his wife: adultery; inferior cooking; even diminished beauty! There were various schools of thought. Jewish law, unlike Roman law, however, did not permit women to initiate divorce proceedings on any grounds at all. From the perspective of the Markan Jesus, Moses only permitted divorce as a concession to "hardness of heart": it was not so from the beginning. The ideal, he insists, is expressed in the Garden Story of Genesis, the story of "one flesh", of partnership, of equality and mutuality, of enduring commitment in marriage.

The Hebrew word <u>'ezer</u> which is translated as "helper" in the first reading from Genesis is used in the Psalms of God's relationship to Israel. It does not denote inferiority of women to men as is sometimes suggested. A better translation might be "companion".

Human limitation is just as much a reality now as it was in the ancient world. We strive for the ideal but fall far short of it in so many ways. When this happens in marriage, the consequences can be more far-reaching than in other aspects of life. The parties involved often become the "little ones" whose lives are shattered and disoriented. The embrace of the community is needed in a particular way for everyone affected by divorce, especially the children. When parents part company, the best interests and needs of the children are sometimes forgotten. Too often, those who have experienced the trauma of divorce feel alienated from the worshipping community, and this at a time when they most need support to face a different future from the one they had envisaged.

The story about marital commitment leads immediately into a story about Jesus taking the children in his arms and blessing them, despite the disciples' attempts to send them away. Children are never to be excluded from the inner circles of love, compassion and care. We might hear today's gospel as a call to be inclusive in all our relationships and to listen to the children's cries for a sustainable and life-giving future.
