Religious Education News

THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday November 10th, 2024 Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B) Gospel: Mark 12:38-44

As he taught them, [Jesus] said, "Watch out for the teachers of the Law, who like to walk around in their long robes and be greeted with respect in the marketplace, who choose the reserved seats in the synagogues and the best places at feasts. They take advantage of widows and rob them of their homes, and then make a show of saying long prayers. Their punishment will be all the worse!"

As Jesus sat near the temple treasury, he watched the people as they dropped in their money. Many rich men dropped in a lot of money; then a poor widow came along and dropped in two little copper coins, worth about a penny. He called his disciples together and said to them, "I tell you that this poor widow put more in the offering box than all the others. For the others put in what they had to spare of their riches; but she, poor as she is, put in all she had—she gave all she had to live on. (Gospel passage taken from Good News Translation)

Gospel reflection:

In this story, Jesus commented that the woman gave everything that she had, while the people who had lots of money just gave a little bit of what they had left over.

Jesus wants us to be generous and to share what we have with others. This is hard but we need to think – are we holding on to more than we need, like the rich people in Jesus' story? Could we give a bit more or have we shared all that we can?

Jesus also shows us in this reading that everyone has something that they can give, even if at first it does not look like much.

We can give money, but we can also give other things too. Can you think of what else we can give and share with others? We can give our time – by listening to others, by being there for them when they are sad or worried. We can give our talents – for example you could sing a song, or paint a picture, or make someone laugh.

The 11th of November marks the significant occasion of when army officials in 1918 agreed that, after 4 years, all fighting in World War I would end. In our liturgy we looked at special symbols, such as the poppy, rosemary, our flags, war medals, candles and the Bible. We focused upon peace in our own communities and how we are called to be the voice of change in our world. At the end of our special liturgy, we observed a minute of silence as a sign of respect and a time for reflection.

PREPARING FOR THE 2024 DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY

How does God want us to Lead and Govern for a Missionary and Synodal Church in the Diocese of Ballarat?

The Diocesan Assembly will take place at Federation University, Mt Helen in the Albert Coates Building commencing Friday evening November 15th and Saturday 16th 2024.

After the formation in preparation for the 2024 Ballarat Diocesan Assembly, the three Parishes of our Ministry District- Ballarat East (& Buninyong), Bungaree (& Clarkes Hill & Dunnstown), Gordon (& Ballan & Springbank) have delegated Rachel Allen & Cathy Prunty (Ballarat East Parish), Dianne Reynolds & Damian Ryan (Bungaree Parish) and Mark Conlan & Sue Daly (Gordon Parish) as the six delegates from our Ministry District. There are 29 Parishes across the Diocese - from the Murray to the Sea that have delegates to the Assembly together with delegates from Catholic agencies, Catholic organisations, entities, Religious Congregations, Diocesan Boards, Commissions, Councils and Panels as well as all Clergy of the Diocese, including Fr's Justin & Matt. Following the Plenary Council of the Catholic Church in Australia and the recently concluded Synod on Synodality, the methodology of the Assembly will include conversations in the Spirit with all delegates to table groups of up to eight with a facilitator trained and commissioned for this ministry.

The Assembly will be facilitated by Sr Karon Donnellan RSM (Leader of the Sisters of Mercy Australia and Papua New Guinea and previously a parishioner of Ballarat East). Many of the 17 table group facilitators belong to the Parishes of our Ministry District - Jo-Anne Bond, Donna Bryce, Rosemary Canavan, Mark Hogbin, Martin Ryan and Loretta Sheppard. In addition to the Parish delegates and the table facilitators, others from Parishes of our Ministry District who are delegates are Bridget Aitchison (ACU), Matt Byrne (DOBCEL), Anne Eskdale (Diocesan Pastoral Planning Panel & Personnel Advisory Board), Sr's Berenice Kerr & Veronica Lawson (Sisters of Mercy), Sharon Lehtonen (DOBCEL) and Fiona Tonkin (Marriage Tribunal), Jane Collins has been central to the preparation of the Assembly as well as colleagues in the Pastoral Ministry Office Julie Boyd and Fran Peterkin. In all we have many from the Parishes of our Ministry District that are significantly involved, not only the six delegates but also as delegates from other entities, table facilitators and parishioners who work for the Diocese in the Pastoral Ministry Office and those who seek to support them.

"A Woman Who Gives Without Counting the Cost."

Gospel reflection by Veronica Lawson RSM

32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Whether the longer or shorter gospel reading is selected for today's liturgy, the literary context deserves attention. Jesus is teaching the crowds in the Jerusalem Temple. He knows the vulnerability of many of the people around him and issues a warning about the grandiose behaviour of the Jerusalem scribes. The scribes were generally learned men on whom the people relied for rulings in matters of sacred law as well as for drawing up contracts and other important documents. commanded the respect of many of the people. Jesus is not impressed by the behaviour of some of the scribes. He sees their pomposity as a mask for dishonesty and exploitation: they will receive the "greater condemnation". "devour the houses of widows" and hide behind the pretext of long pravers.

Widows included women who had lost their husbands through death or divorce as well as single unmarried women. They were women alone without male protection in a patriarchal society and without the benefit of a social security system.

They were dependent for survival upon the care of family and community. Jesus' words of condemnation are strong words that will understandably provoke a reaction. It is no surprise that the Jerusalem scribes are among those who later conspire to kill Jesus (Mark 14:1).

It is easy enough to be taken in by the posturing of those who present as superior and who look for status recognition. It is also easy to miss the generosity of those on the edge even if it is happening before our very eyes. The gospel context presents Jesus as attuned to the plight of the widows. He now notices and draws the attention of his disciples to the action of one particular "destitute" widow. Her tiny contribution to the treasury of two copper coins for the upkeep of the Temple is far more significant than the big sums contributed by the wealthy, ostentatiously and out of their excess.

Is this woman being presented as the victim of an unjust system that extracts from her what she cannot afford, as some commentators insist?



Is the Markan Jesus presenting her as a model of discipleship who, like Jesus of Nazareth, gives her all, despite the exploitation she has known? Is she refusing to be a victim by making her own choice to contribute all that she has? We may not need to choose just one interpretation from among the many. Every powerful story allows for multiple interpretations. It is clear that this woman's action provides a striking contrast to that of the scribes, like the action of another woman who, a little later in the story, breaks a precious jar and pours an abundance of healing ointment over the head of Jesus as he faces the prospect of death. As the gospel draws to a close, then, we find two stories of extravagantly generous unnamed women, stories told in memory of their gospel foolishness.
