A Reminder About Our Parent Code of Conduct

In line with our Child Safety Standards, parents are now asked to only photograph or film their own child. This will particularly apply to assemblies, excursions, and camps, where group photography has been common in the past. We kindly ask all families to support this approach and help us maintain a safe and respectful environment for every child.



THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday May 4, 2025 Third Sunday of Easter (Year C)

Gospel: John 21:1-19

After this, Jesus appeared once more to his disciples at Lake Tiberias. This is how it happened. Simon Peter, Thomas (called the Twin), Nathanael (the one from Cana in Galilee), the sons of Zebedee, and two other disciples of Jesus were all together. Simon Peter said to the others, "I am going fishing."

"We will come with you," they told him. So they went out in a boat, but all that night they did not catch a thing. As the sun was rising, Jesus stood at the water's edge, but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Then he asked them, "Young men, haven't you caught anything?" "Not a thing," they answered.

He said to them, "Throw your net out on the right side of the boat, and you will catch some." So they threw the net out and could not pull it back in because they had caught so many fish. The disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Peter heard that it was the Lord, he wrapped his outer garment round him (for he had taken his clothes off) and jumped into the water. The other disciples came to shore in the boat, pulling the net full of fish. They were not very far from land, about a hundred metres away. When they stepped ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there with fish on it and some bread. Then Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish you have just caught."

Simon Peter went aboard and dragged the net ashore full of big fish, 153 in all; even though there were so many, still the net did not tear. Jesus said to them, "Come and eat." None of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?" because they knew it was the Lord. So Jesus went over, took the bread, and gave it to them; he did the same with the fish. This, then, was the third time Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from death. (Gospel passage taken from Good News Translation)

Gospel reflection

How do you feel when you see someone you haven't seen for ages? Perhaps you have friends or family members who live a long way away? What do you do and say when you see them?

Sitting together to eat is a great way to get to know or to catch up with people and can be lots of fun. Can you think of a time when you have sat with others to eat a meal? Was it dinner at home? Or school lunch? Or at Easter or another special occasion?

Who was there? What did you do? Did you eat in silence? Or did you spend time talking to each other? Did you share the same food?

All around the world, people come together to eat and share food with one another.

Unfortunately, there are lots of people who struggle to get enough food to eat for themselves and their families. Do you think that is fair? Even though there is enough food in the world for everyone to have what they need, it is not shared fairly. Some people have more than they need and some people do not have enough.

Our Challenge: Let's think about all the people who do not have enough food to eat. Let's pray for them and work together with them to make sure that everyone has their fair share of food. Let's give what we can of our time and our talents to make the world a fairer place. (Adapted from CAFOD website)



Talk for Writing: Helping Children Become Confident Writers

At SFX, we are implementing *Talk for Writing* in Foundation to Year 2. It is an engaging and effective approach developed by literacy expert Pie Corbett. This method helps children develop their speaking, storytelling, and writing skills in a structured yet creative way.

What is Talk for Writing?

Talk for Writing is based on the idea that children learn to write by first internalizing language patterns through spoken storytelling. By actively engaging with stories and texts, children build confidence and develop a strong foundation for independent writing. The approach follows three key stages:

1. Imitation – Learning the Model Text

- o Children listen to and learn a model text, often a well-structured story or non-fiction piece.
- They retell the text using actions, pictures, and story maps to embed sentence structures and vocabulary.
- o Drama, role-play, and oral storytelling make learning interactive and fun.

2. Innovation - Adapting the Text

- Once familiar with the model text, children make changes to elements such as characters, settings, or key events.
- o This step encourages creativity while still providing a clear structure to follow.
- o Teachers guide children through shared and guided writing activities.

3. Independent Application – Creating New Texts

- o Finally, children use their learning to plan and write their own original stories or non-fiction pieces.
- o They apply the language patterns, vocabulary, and techniques they have practiced.
- This stage helps children become independent and confident writers.

Why Talk for Writing?

This approach benefits children in many ways:

- ✓ Builds vocabulary and language skills.
- ✓ Develops confidence in speaking and writing.
- ✓ Supports a deeper understanding of story structures and text features.
- ✓ Engages all learners, including those who need additional support.
- ✓ Encourages creativity and independent thinking.

How You Can Support at Home

Parents play a key role in fostering a love of storytelling and writing. Here are some simple ways to support your child:

Read together regularly – Talk about stories, characters, and events.

Encourage storytelling – Ask your child to retell stories they have learned at school.

Create stories together – Invent new characters and adventures as a fun activity.

Use drama and role-play — Act out parts of stories to bring them to life.

Talk for Writing makes learning enjoyable and accessible for all children, helping them grow into confident communicators and writers. If you would like to learn more, feel free to ask me or your child's teacher!

ON THE CONCLAVE COMMENCING MAY 7TH

Archbishop Timothy Costelloe, President of the Australian Bishops Conference, in an interview while in Rome after attending the Funeral of Pope Francis in an interview said the real question is not what kind of pope I want or what kind of pope somebody else wants. The real question is: What kind of pope does the Lord want us to find for the good of the church moving forward?... The real question is not so much "Do we need a pope from Africa? or "Do we need a pope from Asia?" or "Do we need a pope from Oceania?" or "Do we need a pope from Europe?" The real question is what kind of person we do need. There would be great excitement if the next pope were to come from Asia, for example, or from Africa. That would send an important signal about the universality of the church. But equally, if the right person is somewhere in Europe, then he is the one that we should look for and embrace. Pope Francis tried to embed synodality as a culture, as a way of thinking, into the daily life of the church. I think many people will be looking to see that that continues into the future. The capacity of the papacy to be a unifying force struck me strongly, and Francis was very successful in that.

The Universality of the Mission

Reflection on the Gospel-Easter 3C (John 21:1-19)

John 21 represents an addition to the original gospel text of John 1-20, an epilogue that centres on a "third" post-resurrection appearance. Sister of Mercy and biblical scholar Elizabeth Dowling has demonstrated that this final chapter of John marks an unfortunate shift in the portrayal of gender roles in this gospel, a shift that would seem to reflect struggles in the early church around accepting women in leadership roles. While women have featured prominently in earlier chapters, no women feature in this epilogue. The focus here is clearly on Peter, on his role as leader and on his relationship with Jesus. In John 20, it is not at all clear that Peter has come to resurrection faith, while there is no such doubt about the faith of Mary Magdalene, Mary the Tower. It is Mary, tower of strength and light, who receives the first resurrection appearance and it is she who is commissioned to proclaim the news of the resurrection.

In John 21, Peter goes fishing and several other disciples join him. They catch nothing. At dawn, they see Jesus on the shore. His disciples, with the exception of the "beloved disciple", do not recognise him immediately. They follow his instructions and find themselves overwhelmed with their catch. At the invitation of Jesus, they breakfast on bread and fish. This provides the occasion for the rehabilitation of Peter. In the wake of his three-fold denial, Peter makes a three-fold profession of love of Jesus which brings with it the responsibility of tending not only Jesus' "sheep" but also his "lambs". This command has particular resonance for a church whose leadership has failed so many of its children.



Although our Church community is not yet a community of equals, we take heart from Pope Francis' reform of the structure of the Roman Curia. It is notable that Pope Francis introduced the possibility of lay leadership, female or male, of the dicasteries or departments that make up the Curia.

While our gospel reading is filled with symbolism, we might pause to appreciate the material realities underlying the symbols. Fishing is an important gospel metaphor for ministry. The number of fish (153) probably denotes the universality of the mission. The 30% decline in large fish species in my country over the past seventeen years provides a sober reminder that the mission must include the natural world as never before. The untorn net is a symbol of unity, like the seamless garment in the passion narrative. The verb "to draw" has several layers of meaning in this fishing context: the disciples were not able "to draw in the net....so Simon Peter went aboard and drew the net ashore". These statements evoke earlier sayings of Jesus, particularly his words on the cross, "And I if I am lifted up from the earth will draw all to myself" (12:32). The "all" allows for the whole Earth community, human and more-than-human, to be drawn to the crucified and resurrected One, despite the failures of the past.
