Dear Families,

As we move into another busy week here at St Francis Xavier, we acknowledge two significant events in our school calendar - Catholic Education Week and Reconciliation Week.

The Catholic Education Week theme for 2025 is: 'May the God of hope fill you with joy and peace.' (Romans 15:13). This presents an annual opportunity for Catholic schools in the Diocese of Ballarat to celebrate their distinctive ethos and mission with their school and wider communities.

In 2025, 52 primary schools and 11 secondary Colleges educate more than 18,500 students and employ almost 3,000 teachers and staff across the diocese from Mildura in the north, Portland in the south, and west to Edenhope and Nhill. Whilst we cover such a large geographical space, we are blessed to feel like a community and have opportunities to work together and learn from each other.

Reconciliation Week is also acknowledged at the same time each year, commemorating the 1967 referendum and the High Court Mabo decision. The Reconciliation Week theme is 'Bridging now to Next', presenting the call to walk forward together.

These celebrations provide authentic moments for discussions around who we are and who we are called to be. Whilst each has their own distinct messages, connections can certainly be found between the two. In both, we see a commitment to togetherness and a future fueled by hope.

I wonder what kinds of conversations these occasions prompt within the classroom, or even at home. Chat with your children about what they are learning and what experiences and ideas these events have opened up for them - I bet they will be able to share something!

The past week has been full of productive activity across our school. Our swimming program continued for Years 1, 3, 4, and 6, giving students a great opportunity to build their skills and confidence in the water. Meanwhile, our Year 5 and 6 students were treated to a special excursion to St Patrick's College to enjoy a performance of Newsies—a wonderful chance to experience the magic of live theatre.

Inside our classrooms, rich and engaging learning continues each day. Our dedicated teachers provide exceptional teaching experiences that help our students grow academically and personally. It's also wonderful to see so many opportunities being offered beyond the classroom, helping us support the development of well-rounded learners.

Gospel reflection




Catholic Education Week May 26-30

In addition to my existing roles as School Counsellor and Religious Education Leader, I'm proud to be taking on the new position of Mental Health and Wellbeing Leader, through the **Mental Health in Primary Schools (MHiPS) Initiative**.

The **Mental Health in Primary Schools (MHiPS) Initiative** is a Victorian Government program developed in partnership with the **Murdoch Children's Research Institute (MCRI)**. Its goal is to help primary schools support the mental health and wellbeing of students through early intervention, practical resources, and whole-school approaches.

It allows us to take a more coordinated and proactive approach—equipping our staff with the tools and knowledge to support students early, and creating a whole-school environment where mental health is understood, supported, and prioritised. Supporting mental health is a team effort, and I'm here to be part of that team—working together with you to help every child feel heard, supported, and empowered. I will also work collaboratively with our existing Wellbeing Team, in particular our Wellbeing Leader Gemma Johnson.

Wellbeing is at the heart of learning, and I'm passionate about helping every child feel safe, valued, and supported spiritually, emotionally, and mentally. I look forward to working with our amazing school community to build on the strong foundation we already have. I will be attending some professional learning this Thursday and Friday, run by the University of Melbourne. Curriculum News



Our dedicated teachers are currently engaged in moderating and compiling your child/ren's work samples and assessment results to ensure that Semester One reports are accurate and reflective of each student's progress. I extend my sincere thanks to our teachers for the energy, care, and professionalism they bring to this important task. As always, St Francis Xavier Primary School remains committed to working in partnership with parents and carers to support every child in reaching their full potential.

Semester One reports will be available via PAM from Thursday, 3rd July 4:00pm. The Semester One Formal Reports will include:

- 1. A Religious Education comment detailing your child's Semester One learning outcomes and opportunities in alignment with our Awakenings Core Document.
- 2. A personalised written comment to celebrate your child's achievements, particularly in relation to their Personal / Social Learning, English and mathematics.
- 3. A personalised comment to identify your child's Next Steps in Learning to ensure future success and growth.

- 4. Level of attainment in the form of a dot on a continuum for the learning areas explicitly taught in Semester One and in accordance with the Victorian Curriculum Achievement Standards:
 - · English (Reading & Viewing, Writing, Speaking & Listening)
 - · Mathematics
 - \cdot Visual Arts
 - \cdot Performing Arts
 - · Health and Physical Education
 - \cdot Science / Environmental Education
 - Technologies
 - · Humanities- History
 - Capabilities = Ethical (Yrs 3&5), Personal and Social (F-6) Critical and Creative Thinking (Yrs 2-6) and Intercultural (Yrs 4&6))
- 5. An Auslan grading using a 5 point scale.

Please note a small change to this semester's Mathematics reporting.

In line with updated guidelines from the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA), each student will now receive **one progression point dot** for Mathematics, rather than the three progression point dots used in previous years. All year levels will only have one dot and no previous dot from last year.

Last Thursday, our school shared the **National Simultaneous Storytime** story *The Truck Cat* by **Deborah Frenkel**, illustrated by **Dannie Snell**—a gentle, heartwarming tale of an adventurous cat who finds an unexpected home in the cab of a long-haul truck.

The book explores themes of trust, friendship, and belonging—but it also offers a deeper message. As author Deborah Frenkel notes, "7.5 million Australians come from somewhere else. Many more of us have parents or grandparents who did. That means in so many families, there's a story like Yacoub's, and one thing I hope is that this book will open up conversations about family stories of migration."

This beautiful message makes *The Truck Cat* not just a story for children, but an invitation to reflect on our own family journeys. And, of course, "this is a book for any cat person too—or anyone who loves animals. Or trucks!"

Keep the Story Going at Home

Here are some ways families can continue engaging with *The Truck Cat*:

- Share your family's migration story Talk about where your family came from and how they arrived in Australia. What journeys have your relatives taken?
- **Re-read the book together** Look closely at the illustrations and discuss how the characters might be feeling throughout the story.
- **Draw or write your own adventure** Encourage your child to imagine a tale about an animal on a journey. Where would they go, and who would they meet?
- **Spot trucks on the road** Use everyday outings as a chance to talk about trucks, travel, and where people (and pets!) go.
- Visit the library Explore books about cats, trucks, travel, or migration stories that reflect your own family's history.

National Simultaneous Storytime is a wonderful way to spark conversations, nurture imagination, and build a love of reading in our school community. Thank you for being part of this shared celebration at SFX!

Child Safe Standard 4: Families and communities are involved in promoting child safety and wellbeing.

Gender Diversity



In today's world, many young people are exploring who they are - not just in terms of career aspirations or friendships, but also how they understand themselves, including their gender identity. For some, this journey is straightforward. For others, it can involve questioning, rethinking or expressing gender in ways that may not align with traditional expectations.

As a parent or caregiver, it's completely natural to feel uncertain or even overwhelmed at times. You might have questions, concerns, or simply want to better understand how to respond in a way that's helpful and affirming. The important thing to know is that gender diversity is not new - but our awareness and understanding of it is growing. It means recognising that not everyone experiences gender in the same way. While many young people feel comfortable with the gender they assigned at birth, others may experience or express their gender in ways that feel different to what's traditionally expected.

Supporting a gender-diverse child doesn't require you to be an expert - it requires you to be present, open-minded and willing to listen. Research shows that young people who feel accepted and supported by their families have significantly better mental health outcomes, regardless of where they are in their gender journey.



This year marks the 10th anniversary of the practice of tying ribbons to fences as a sign of support for people who have suffered child sexual abuse. This practice began in Ballarat during the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse.

Over the past twelve months there have been discussions between members of the LOUD fence group and members of parish councils from St Patrick's Cathedral and St Alipius Ballarat East and these discussions have fostered mutual understanding about the ribbons. Such dialogue can also lead to an agreement about steps that we can take together, such as the agreement to tie ribbons to a particular section of the cathedral fence. A recent message from the LOUD fence group explained the ribbons in this way. "The Ribbons symbolise support for Survivors, their right to a voice for past harms and their visual reminder to those who care for children of their responsibility to prevent child sexual abuse." I realise that people have varied responses to the ribbons. However, I encourage you to look on the ribbons in a positive way, as a sign of support for survivors of abuse and as a reminder to the whole community of the need to do all we can to keep children safe.

I have been grateful for the dialogue between the LOUD fence group and representatives of parish councils and I endorse the agreements reached. When ribbons are placed on fences in line with such agreements, I ask that the ribbons be left in place as a mark of support for survivors and as a reminder to us all of our responsibility to make our communities safe places for everyone. 
Finding Peace in the Unfathomable Mystery of God

Reflection on the Gospel-Easter 6C (John 14:23-29) Veronica M. Lawson RSM

"Take from my heart all painful anxiety." This was the prayer of Venerable Catherine McAuley, the first Sister of Mercy. It echoes the words of the Johannine Jesus, "Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not let them be afraid." It is all a matter of love. Disciples of Jesus of Nazareth know that they need not be anxious or afraid "for perfect love casts out fear" (1 John 4:18). Today's gospel makes it clear that "love" finds expression in the keeping of God's word.

In the prologue to the gospel, John has presented Jesus as the Word, the *Logos* who has been with God from the beginning. Jesus is the word of God in human form, the embodiment of God's communication with the cosmos. Jesus keeps God's word. Disciples are to demonstrate their love for Jesus by keeping the word that he both embodies and proclaims. In other words, they are to live as Jesus has lived and be faithful to what he has taught in God's name. They will thus become a dwelling place for the divine. The implications of this teaching are overwhelming. If we truly believed and "kept" the words of the Johannine Jesus, we might be more inclined to treat each other and "our common home" with the utmost reverence and respect.

Jesus refers once more to his imminent departure. When he is no longer physically present, God's Advocate, the Holy Spirit, will be with them. The Greek word translated as "advocate" carries a range of meanings. It literally means "one called alongside to help" whenever necessary.



True disciples need not be troubled or afraid because they are never alone. The Holy Spirit, the Advocate, is always with them to defend them, to intercede for them, to comfort them, as well as to keep them focussed on all that Jesus has said to them. Earlier in this chapter of John's gospel, the Advocate is called the Spirit of Truth who remains with them and is actually in them. Only through the power of the Spirit will the disciples be empowered to "keep the word" of Jesus.

Jesus gifts his friends with peace, a peace "that the world cannot give." In John's gospel, the "world" is first and foremost the tenting place of God's Word: it is God's creation. Occasionally, as here, it refers to whatever is opposed to God's Word. The gift of peace that Jesus brings is a peace that casts out fear. It carries all the weight of the Hebrew *shalom*: it brings total wellbeing and peace of mind. True peace comes from being centred in God and gathering in all of God's creation. We long for that peace in our troubled times. As Jesus leaves them, the proper stance for the disciples is joy in the knowledge that, although he is going away, he is also "coming to them" since the Spirit will be with them. The gospel reading thus leaves us to find peace in the unfathomable mystery of God.
