Dear families,

Our Year 4 students have been especially busy recently as they celebrated the sacrament of First Eucharist. This is a significant milestone in their faith journey and a deeply meaningful time for their families, as they gather together in prayer and celebration.

At Mass over the weekend, Fr. Justin shared the Gospel story of the feeding of the 5,000. It's a story our students know well. They are familiar with the details—how Jesus and his disciples, weary after a long day of preaching and healing, were still moved with compassion for the crowds. As evening approached, Jesus knew he could not send the people away hungry. And so, with just a few loaves and some small fish, everyone was fed.

In the eyes of our children, that moment is the miracle—how so many could be nourished from so little. But perhaps the deeper miracle lies not only in the food that was shared, but in the spiritual nourishment that came from Jesus' presence and message. Perhaps those gathered left not just full in body, but in spirit—strengthened by God's love, compassion and inclusiveness.

We may never know exactly what happened that day. But through the Gospels and the gift of faith, we are invited to believe. And through the wisdom of the Holy Spirit, we are guided in understanding what it means to live as followers of Christ today.

It was a joy to witness our Year 4 students take this special step in their faith journey. We are proud of them and wish them every blessing as they continue to grow in their relationship with God. Well done, children!

THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday April 27, 2025 The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Year C)

Gospel: Luke 9:11-17 Jesus welcomed the crowds, spoke to them about the Kingdom of God, and healed those who needed it. When the sun was beginning to set, the twelve disciples came to him and said, "Send the people away so that they can go to the villages and farms around here and find food and lodging, because this is a lonely place." But Jesus said to them, "You yourselves give them something to eat." They answered, "All we have are five loaves and two fish. Do you want us to go and buy food for this whole crowd?" (There were about 5,000 men there.) Jesus said to his disciples, "Make the people sit down in groups of about fifty each."

After the disciples had done so, Jesus took the five loaves and two fish, looked up to heaven, thanked God for them, broke them and gave them to the disciples to distribute to the people. They all ate and had enough, and the disciples took up twelve baskets of what was left over. (*Gospel passage taken from Good News Translation*)

Gospel Reflection

In the gospel, through God's grace, everyone, all 5,000 people, eat the bread and the fish, and there is plenty left over. Just like Jesus asks the disciples to feed the crowd in today's reading, we are also asked to do whatever we can to make sure that everyone has enough to eat. Even though there is enough food produced in the world to feed everyone there are many people who go without food every day – both here in Australia and in other countries. How does it make you feel to hear that? Do you think it is fair?

One of the things we can do is to ask the government to support the people around the world who grow food, not the big companies. Another thing we can do is to share whatever we can with one another.

This week let's give thanks for the food that we have. Let us remember to thank God for all that we have been given, as well as thanking and praying for all the people who are involved in getting the food we eat from the farm to our table.

Our Challenge: Let try to do one thing this week to help make the world a fairer place, so that everyone has enough to eat. (*Adapted from CAFOD Website*)

The **"Inquisitive Quality Curriculum F–6"** (Australia) refers to a structured, inquiry-based teaching and learning resource designed to support the delivery of the **Humanities and Social Sciences (HASS)** curriculum, aligned with the **Australian Curriculum** for Foundation (F) to Year 6. It provides **structured units of work** that support the **HASS learning area**, including **History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship, and Economics and Business** (where applicable by year level). The program aims to foster student curiosity, critical thinking, research skills, and active citizenship through **inquiry learning**.


Here at St Francis Xavier our Literacy block is aligned to our Inquisitive units so children are learning about a specific topic through reading and writing and then on some afternoons have an opportunity to explore more.

It is called a "quality curriculum" because it is:

- Aligned to the Australian Curriculum
- Scaffolded with lesson sequences and differentiated tasks
- Designed to promote deep thinking and understanding
- Resourced with high-quality visuals, source materials, and assessment tools

Introducing the 11 Child Safe Standards from the Commission for Children and Young People (CCYP)

As an organisation St Francis Xavier Primary School must implement the following 11 standards.

Standard 1: Organisations establish a culturally safe environment in which the diverse and unique identities and experiences of Aboriginal children and young people are respected and valued.

Standard 2: Child safety and wellbeing is embedded in organisational leadership, governance and culture.

Standard 3: Children and young people are empowered about their rights, participate in decisions affecting them and are taken seriously.

Standard 4: Families and communities are informed and involved in promoting child safety and wellbeing.

Standard 5: Equity is upheld and diverse needs respected in policy and practice.

Standard 6: People working with children and young people are suitable and supported to reflect child safety and wellbeing values in practice.

Standard 7: Processes for complaints and concerns are child-focused.

Standard 8: Staff and volunteers are equipped with the knowledge, skills and awareness to keep children and young people safe through ongoing education and training.

Standard 9: Physical and online environments promote safety and wellbeing while minimising the opportunity for children and young people to be harmed.

Standard 10: Implementation of the Child Safe Standards is regularly reviewed and improved.

Standard 11: Policies and procedures document how the organisation is safe for children and young people.

The CCYP are running an initiative called 'What Matters Most' where you can 'Share your story, make a difference and win great prizes'!

What Matters Most is a chance for children and young people to tell the CCYP about what is important to them and what needs to change to make things better.

The stories shared with the CCYP will help inform the issues we focus on and the solutions they put forward when the CCYP talks to the government and other decision makers.

You can share your story however you like; write it down, draw a picture, record a video or create a piece of music. The CCYP wants you to submit something that's unique to you.

You can focus on any topic you like, for example, school, family or home, hobbies, culture, or religious beliefs.

You can also use of of the CCYP prompts to get your creativity flowing:

BISHOP SHANE APPOINTED ARCHBISHOP OF BRISBANE

Pope Leo has appointed Bishop Shane Mackinlay as Archbishop of Brisbane. Australian Catholic Bishops Conference President, Archbishop Timothy Costelloe SDB, welcomed the appointment. "The Archbishop-elect's pastoral experience in his home diocese of Ballarat, and his leadership of the diocese of Sandhurst, together with his strong academic background, will stand him in good stead as he takes up the new challenge of pastoral leadership in the Archdiocese of Brisbane," "We pray that Bishop Mackinlay will help empower the people of Brisbane to discover and use their gifts, inspire them with a vision of what the Church can be, and provide new opportunities and resources for all to encounter Christ," Archbishop Costelloe said.

Bishop Shane is well known in our Ministry District having been raised by his parents Helen and Malcom as parishioners of St Alipius and primary schooling at St Francis Xavier Ballarat East. +Shane was ordained priest in St Alipius Church in 1991. Prior to his appointment as Bishop of Sandhurst he was parish priest of the Bungaree parish and visiting priest to the parish of Gordon. A Mass of Thanksgiving (Farewell Mass) will be held at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Bendigo on Sunday 7 September 2025. Bishop Mackinlay will be installed as Archbishop of Brisbane at St Stephen's Cathedral, on Thursday 11 September 2025.

HOW DOES GOD WANT US TO LEAD AND GOVERN FOR A MISSIONARY SYNODAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF BALLARAT – TRUST

Trust in the Diocese is viewed as very low and rebuilding trust within the Diocese of Ballarat requires a multi-faceted approach, addressing various forms of trust. A new relationship of trust and confidence needs to be created within the diocese, church and the wider community.

Trust can be restored through a renewed emphasis on transparency, humility and a deep commitment to God's mission.

Institutional trust calls for significant reforms in governance, accountability and the ongoing commitment to safeguarding.

Relational trust, which connects clergy, laity and the wider community, can be rebuilt by fostering a synodal Church. This requires a culture and practice of walking together and exercising co-responsibility for the sake of the common mission.

The importance of fostering trust in local communities was emphasised, highlighting that these communities are essential in nurturing faith and building strong relationships within their own situations. Delegates recognised that local parishes were often the primary touchpoints for individuals and families, where they experience the support and guidance of the Church. Trust in these communities is crucial for ensuring that the Church remains grounded in the needs of the parish/organisations and allowing for more effective pastoral care, outreach and spiritual growth.

Making a Place at the Table

Reflection on the Gospel-The Body and Blood of Christ Year C


(Luke 9:11-17)

The gospel for today brings together elements that have traditionally formed part of Christian worship. In the first part of the story, Jesus welcomes those who follow him. He then speaks to them of God's kin-dom and heals those in need of healing. In the second part, he takes the loaves, blesses them, breaks them and puts them before the disciples who distribute the bread to the assembled people. All eat and are satisfied.

The second part of the story is full of eucharistic symbolism. The setting is a "desert" place, recalling the wanderings of the Israelites in the desert of Sinai. The hunger of the people recalls God's care of Israel in the wilderness. God feeds God's people in the deserts of life, but only if those called to be disciples recognise their responsibility to be the hands of God. "Send them away" is one solution, clearly not the one preferred by Jesus. Rather, he says, "You give them something to eat". They are said to number "five thousand men (andres)". The women and children are simply not counted. When the people sit down in circles and share their food, they find there is more than enough for everyone. They gather up the broken pieces, just as we must remember to gather up the pieces that so often go to waste.

Jesus' actions and words over the bread [and the fish] are echoed in the account of his final meal with the disciples: the bread broken and shared becomes his body broken and "given" for them. In the celebration of Eucharist, bread broken and wine poured out change their meaning.



While all analogies fall short, we might begin to understand this mystery by thinking of the Eureka flag. The flag is constructed of fabric and thread, but it is no longer simply the sum of its material parts, precious as they are. The restored flag is housed in a special place and protected with the utmost care. Because of its associations with the Eureka rebellion and what that stands for in Australian history, it has taken on a meaning beyond the goodness of the materiality of fabric and thread. In the celebration of Eucharist, the God-given gifts of bread and wine likewise become more than their material parts. They are life for us, the shared life of the Risen Christ. Eucharistic life is covenanted life. Recognition of another level of meaning does not discount the integrity and goodness of the underlying material reality, but rather affirms it.

Sharing in Eucharist means giving life for the sake of the many, sometimes to the point of heroism, sometimes simply by sharing our resources or our left-over pieces with others in need. Finally, it is important to remember that the healing is the prelude to the sharing of the bread. We are called to ensure there is a place at the table for those so often excluded from community by disability, ill-health or any kind of prejudice.
