AUSLAN

As part of the St Francis Xavier semester reports, families will receive an update on their child's learning in Auslan.

Within the Auslan report, families can expect to receive;

- an overview of semester one learning. This will be in the form of a short paragraph, explaining the elements of Auslan that were the learning focus for semester one.
- A statement that reflects your child's level of achievement. This will be in the form of a five point scale,
 - Starting to work towards level
 - Working towards level
 - Working at level
 - o Working above level
 - o Working well above level

Alongside the semester reports your child also shares their learning in Auslan twice yearly at student led conferences, via seesaw (where applicable).

The delivery of Auslan at St Francis Xavier follows a 'Teachers as Co-learners' model. As the title suggests, our teachers are also learners and are supported by our Language Assistant and Auslan expert, Chantelle Stacey. Chantelle works alongside both teachers and students through the Teachers as Co-Learners program, ensuring the Auslan curriculum is delivered accurately and in a culturally appropriate way.

THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday June 1, 2025 Seventh Sunday of Easter (Year C)

Gospel: John 17:20-26

Jesus looked up to heaven and said: "I pray not only for them, but also for those who believe in me because of their message. I pray that they may all be one. Father! May they be in us, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they be one, so that the world will believe that you sent me. I gave them the same glory you gave me, so that they may be one, just as you and I are one: I in them and you in me, so that they may be completely one, in order that the world may know that you sent me and that you love them as you love me. Father! You have given them to me, and I want them to be with me where I am, so that they may see my glory, the glory you gave me; for you loved me before the world was made. Righteous Father! The world does not know you, but I know yo u, and these know that you sent me. I made you known to them, and I will continue to do so, in order that the love you have for me may be in them, and so that I also may be in them." (Gospel passage taken from Good News Translation)

Gospel reflection: Jesus is praying to God for his disciples and for all people who will come to believe in him through the disciples. Jesus asked that all his people could be as one - this means that they all stand united, they love one another, live peacefully and work together.

We are all different, but even though we are different, we have lots of things in common with each other. There is one very special thing we all share- God loves us all. We are all sisters and brothers, no matter who we are or where in the world we live. We are all part of one global family, loved by God. God wants that love to shine through us in the way that we treat each other.

We are called to love one another and to live together in harmony. This doesn't mean all being the same or that we all have to agree about everything, but it does mean that we should always be kind and loving to one another, treating each other as we would wish to be treated.

CULTURAL COMPETENCY FOR MISSION

On Wednesday and Thursday of this coming week Frs Justin and Shaiju will participate in a two-day workshop on Cultural Competency for Mission to be facilitated by Patrick Fox of Catholic Mission Australia. THE WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

The theme for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2025 is "Do you believe this?" (John 11:26). The 2025 prayers and reflections for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity were prepared by the brothers and sisters of the monastic community of Bose in northern Italy and mark the 1700 Anniversary of the of the Council of Nicaea, the first Ecumenical Council.

Prayer for the week:

We believe in one God, the Father almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible. And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, the only-begotten, begotten of the Father before all ages. Light of Light, true God of true God, begotten not made, of one essence with the Father by whom all things were made; who for us men and for our salvation, came down from heaven, and was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became man. And He was crucified for us under Pontius Pilate, and suffered, and was buried. And the third day He rose again, according to the Scriptures; and ascended into heaven, and sits at the right hand of the Father; and He shall come again with glory to judge the living and the dead; whose Kingdom shall have no end. And in the Holy Spirit. Amen.

HOW DOES GOD WANT US TO LEAD AND GOVERN FOR A MISSIONARY SYNODAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF BALLARAT – TRANSFORMATION AND CONVERSION

Transformation and conversion call for a deep and ongoing renewal of both structure and spirit. The diocese is called to undergo a conversion of heart, fostering a culture of humility, transparency, and accountability, particularly in addressing the failures of child sexual abuse.

This includes not only considering clericalism and abuse of power but also embracing a more inclusive approach that values the voices of all People of God, particularly the marginalised groups of women, young people and the underprivileged. The transformation should also extend to the hierarchical structure, which must adapt to the evolving needs of the global community while remaining faithful to the Gospel.

A focus on people and pastoral care, rather than institutional preservation is necessary, emphasising listening with compassion, justice and service over power and control. Such changes require a commitment to personal conversion for both clergy and laity, centred on a renewed commitment to the teachings of Christ, openness to the Holy Spirit and the active pursuit of truth, justice and healing in the world. The prophetic spirit — challenging all to live in a world in which justice, peace, equality and community are the standard rather than a battle. Imagining a new normal can lead to the development of a different vision of life, challenging the status quo.

'I have called you by name, you are mine'

LOUD FENCE RIBBONS

Dear Parishioners.

This year marks the 10th anniversary of the practice of tying ribbons to fences as a sign of support for people who have suffered child sexual abuse. This practice began in Ballarat during the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse.

Over the past twelve months there have been discussions between members of the LOUD fence group and members of parish councils from St Patrick's Cathedral and St Alipius Ballarat East and these discussions have fostered mutual understanding about the ribbons. Such dialogue can also lead to an agreement about steps that we can take together, such as the agreement to tie ribbons to a particular section of the cathedral fence. A recent message from the LOUD fence group explained the ribbons in this way. "The Ribbons symbolise support for Survivors, their right to a voice for past harms and their visual reminder to those who care for children of their responsibility to prevent child sexual abuse." I realise that people have varied responses to the ribbons. However, I encourage you to look on the ribbons in a positive way, as a sign of support for survivors of abuse and as a reminder to the whole community of the need to do all we can to keep children safe. I have been grateful for the dialogue between the

I have been grateful for the dialogue between the LOUD fence group and representatives of parish councils and I endorse the agreements reached. When ribbons are placed on fences in line with such agreements, I ask that the ribbons be left in place as a mark of support for survivors and as a reminder to us all of our responsibility to make our communities safe places for everyone. Being Witnesses to the Ends of the Earth

Reflection on the Gospel-Feast of the Ascension Year C (Luke 24:46-53)

Loss is part of the human condition and the physical death of a loved one is among the most painful experiences of loss. Today's Feast of the Ascension invites us to face the experience of loss in a transformative way. In Ordinary Time, we celebrate the life and ministry of Jesus. Over the period of Lent and Easter, we have been re-membering his death and resurrection. As we approach the end of the Easter season, the liturgy draws us into another aspect of the Mystery, that of the presence and absence of Jesus who has been raised.

The Lukan Ascension stories as found in the gospel and in today's first reading (Acts 1:1-11) presuppose a pre-scientific, three-tiered understanding of the structure of the world. In this ancient view, God is in the heavens above and the prophet Jesus, like the prophet Elijah of old, is caught up into God's realm from whence the Holy Spirit will "descend" upon God's people. This vertical (up and down) movement is balanced by a horizontal movement.

In Acts, Jesus' family and friends who grieve the loss of their loved one are told not to keep looking up to the heavens. They have work to do: they must return to Jerusalem for the present and be empowered by the Holy Spirit to continue the prophetic ministry of Jesus ("clothed with power from on high"), to be his witnesses to the ends of the earth.

They have to face the fact that the physical loss of Jesus means a new and different sort of presence and that they have a role to play in making him present in their world. Like us, the early Christians needed time to grasp each dimension of the one great mystery of God's presence among them.

In the gospel account, the disciples gathered in Jerusalem are to be witnesses to the death and resurrection of Jesus. They are to proclaim a gospel of "repentance and forgiveness". In the gospel (Luke 24:47) their audience is "all the nations", while in Acts 1:8, they are commissioned to be witnesses to Jesus "in all Jerusalem, in Judaea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth". In other words, the good news is not only for the earth's human inhabitants but for the earth itself. Pope Francis, in calling us to be attentive to the cry of the poor, insisted that the earth itself is "among the most maltreated and abandoned of our poor" (Laudato Si' 2).

Joy, peace and blessing have the final word in Luke's gospel. They have permeated Luke's story from the outset. Joy, peace and blessing fill our hearts as we give thanks for our newly elected pontiff, Pope Leo XIV. And as we prepare for the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, we pray that the spirit of joy and peace that animated the earliest Christians will be with all of God's people and that the entire planetary community might know the blessing of God.
